So take time to be involved in your chapter and to expand your relationships in the chapter, at both the regional level and the international level. A licensed general contractor, he oversees and manages all of their project managers and superintendents. The firm is now averaging 20 ground-up buildings and 150 up-fits a year. In addition to his house corporation, Andujar volunteers as chairman of the board of trustees of Matthews United Methodist Church, and serves on the building committee with Habitat for Humanity. He and his wife, Chandra, reside in Matthews, North Carolina with their three children, Luke, Ethan and Salem.

Charles M. Harris (Rhodes, Theta 1986)



Charles Harris was president of his chapter and has been an officer of his house corporation since 1995. He is a senior vice president of Allen & O'Hara Development Co., LLC (AODC), which is a subsidiary of Education

Realty Trust (a publically traded real estate investment trust). AODC, a Memphis based company, has been in the business of developing, building, owning, and managing student housing since the early 1960s. AODC had introduced the "suite style" facility (two double dorm rooms sharing a bathroom) in 1964 and by 1969 they were managing over 10,000 student beds. To this day, AODC prides itself in staying on the cutting edge of the market with regard to living communities on and around campuses. At AODC, Harris has been directly involved with over \$1 billion of student housing development work over the past 11 years. Prior to joining AODC, he was a development analyst with Promus Hotel Corporation. He also served on the board of directors of Dixie Boys & Girls Club in Memphis for 10 years. Harris and his family reside in Germantown, Tennessee.

LAMBDA PSI CHAPTER CHARTERED AT CALIFORNIA STATE-CHICO

The brothers of Lambda Psi Chapter are proud to be recognized as the newest chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha, and the newest fraternity at their host institution, California State-Chico, commonly called "Chico State".

When the idea was formed to bring Pike to Chico, it had great support due to the fact that Pike is known to be a positive asset to the college experience and the surrounding community. Pike had full support from the Chico State Sororities and the PanHellenic Council. However, the other fraternities on campus didn't welcome Pike with open arms until they were reminded vividly that a little competition didn't hurt.

After nine academic months of being known as the Chico Colony, the men of this group were initiated and became the newest set of Pike brothers across the U.S. and Canada, On November 6, 2010, 64 individuals were initiated and the chapter was installed the following day. The initiation took place at the Chico State campus with the help of Theta Tau (California State-Sacramento), Kappa Nu (Pacific), and Iota Beta (California State-Fresno) Chapters. The colony was installed as Lambda Psi Chapter the following day by International President Kevin Virta (Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83), Pacific Coast Regional President Michael McMillan (California-San Diego, Kappa Phi '97), Director of Expansion Ryan Collett (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04) and former Expansion Consultant Patrick Coleman (Embry-Riddle, Lambda Mu '05). After installation, a chartering banquet was held at Tuscan Ridge Golf Course, where international officers and Memorial Headquarters staff, Chico State Greek Advisor Larry Bassow, Lambda Psi brothers, the Iota Beta initiation team family, and dates all celebrated the closure of a long journey from colonization to chapter.

As a colony, these men were the top recruiting fraternity at Chico State for three consecutive semesters and tied for first with the highest GPA. In the first semester as a colony, they won the most letters written for the Up 'til Dawn fundraising campaign,

a nation wide philanthropy for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. As the brothers build upon the PIKE foundation laid down at Chico State, they intend to continue being tops in athletics and social preference.

Now that their colony processes have come to a conclusion and the new journey of being a chapter is under way, a hearty expression of gratitude goes out to all the people that made this possible. The Lambda Psi Chapter is composed of men of integrity, ready to spread the four pillars of PIKE: Scholars, Leaders, Athletes, and Gentlemen, through the Chico State Campus and to the future generations of Lambda Psi Chapter.

The University

In 1887 the California Legislature approved the creation of the Northern Branch of the State Normal School for the purpose of training and educating teachers. Chico was chosen as the site and construction began on the Chico Normal School, which opened its doors to 90 students in 1889. Throughout the years, the college grew and its name changed to reflect that growth-from Chico Normal School to Chico State Teachers College to Chico State College. In 1972, it became known as California State University, Chico. The University offers more than 100 undergraduate majors and options. Ever since the university opened, the Greek community has thrived. The Chico Greek system is one that has high expectations and guides its members to success.

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


PIKE SPORTS REVIEW


FOOTBALL




The Florida State Seminole squad, under head coach Jimbo Fisher (Florida State, Delta Lambda '10), won the Chick-fil-A Bowl to finish with a 10-4 record. Cornerback Greg Reid (Delta Lambda '10) was named the Defensive Player of the Game after breaking up four passes, making five tackles and running for 71 yards on three returns. Fisher was named first year Head Coach of the Year by the Football Writers Association and Reid was a first team selection on the North-American Interfraternity Conference All-Fraternity All-American Team for NCAA FBS schools. He also was named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference second team after ranking fourth with 65 tackles, running back 31 kickoffs for a 23.9 average, breaking up 14 passes and averaging 10.1 on 31 punt returns.

Also playing a major role for the Seminoles was safety Nick Moody (Delta Lambda '10), who was third with 79 tackles and returned an interception for a 96 yard touchdown. Running back Lonnie Pryor (Delta Lambda '09) ran for 112 yards, caught 12 passes and tied for second with 42 points on seven TDs. Linebacker Christian Jones (Delta Lambda '10) was in on 18 tackles, including three sacks, while linebacker Vincent Zann (Delta Lambda '08) and back Justin Bright (Delta Lambda '10) made good contributions. Also on the Seminoles squad were deep snapper Phil Doumar (Delta Lambda '09), defensive back Mike Schill (Delta Lambda '08) plus quarterbacks Andrew Nowell (Delta Lambda '07) and Clint Trickett (Delta Lambda '09).

Starting for the fourth year on the 9-2 Miami Sun Bowl squad was linebacker Colin McCarthy (Gamma Omega '07) who led the Hurricanes with 119 tackles. He was named to the NIC All-Fraternity All-American first team, the All-ACC second team and the Senior Bowl. The 8-4 Florida International squad won the Little Caesars Pizza Bowl and featured six Pike players. Cocaptain/linebacker Toronto Smith (Kappa Gamma '08) was named to the All-Fraternity All-American and All-Sun Belt first teams after ranking second with 91 tackles, including 13 versus Louisiana-Monroe. Also chosen for the All-Sun Belt first team was co-captain/center Brad Serini (Kappa Gamma '08). Playing in 12 contests for FIU





were tight end Colt Anderson (*Kappa Gamma '08*) and defensive back Marquis Rolle (*Kappa Gamma '09*) while tight end Joey Harrison (*Kappa Gamma '10*) appeared in 10 games.

Other Pike coaches and players were on teams that went to bowl games. Punter Derek Epperson (*Theta Nu '08*) of the 7-6 **Baylor** Texas Bowl squad was named to the All-Fraternity All-American first team and the All-Big 12 second team in addition to being a Ray Guy Award nominee once again. He had 55 punts for a 43.7 average,

with a best of 65 yards and 15 downed inside the 20 yard line. Two Pikes saw action for the 11-2 **Virginia Tech**Orange Bowl team with fullback Kenny Younger (*Epsilon '07*) starting eight contests. Playing in four games was defensive end Jeff Wardach (*Epsilon '09*). Linebacker Cameron Rogers (*Beta Zeta '09*) was in on 15 tackles for the 7-7 **SMU** Armed Forces Bowl team and running back Mike Salvatico (*Delta Psi '07*) saw action for the 9-4 **Maryland** Military Bowl club. The **Kentucky** BBVA Compass Bowl squad included defensive end Patrick Ligon (*Omega '11*) and receivers Alex Dutton (*Omega '08*) and Nathan Dutton (*Omega '08*). Head coach **Dabo Swinney**

(Alabama, Gamma Alpha '89) took his **Clemson** team to the Meinecke Car Care Bowl.

Defensive end Dain Taylor (Delta Omicron '07) was the top player among 16 Pikes on the 7-4 Drake squad. He was named to the AFCA All-American first team and the All-Fraternity All-American first team, in addition to being named Pioneer Football League Defensive Player of the Year and Drake MVP. He ranked third nationally in tackles for loss (24) and sacks (13.5) among his 59 stops. Named to the All-Pioneer second team was defensive end Andrew Asbell (Delta Omicron '07), who had 37 tackles, including four sacks. Other key defenders were back Nick Chenier (Delta Omicron '08) with 43 stops; back Jim Nelson (Delta Omicron '08) with 11 tackles: lineman Naser Hannoon (Delta Omicron '10) and linebackers Jake Underwood (Delta Omicron '10) and Cam Good (Delta Omicron 10).







The Drake offense was led by All-Pioneer Football League honorable mention quarterback Mike Piatkowski (Delta Omicron '08). He completed 161 passes in 278 attempts for 1,854 vards and 15 TDs while rushing for 160 yards and four scores. The leading rusher was fullback Patrick Cashmore (Delta Omicron '08) who ran for 357 yards (4.7 average) and six touchdowns. Wide receiver Nick Rosa (Delta Omicron '10) had 17 catches for 148 yards while tight end Kevin Marshall (Delta Omicron '10) played in five contests. Billy Janssen (Delta Omicron '08) gained All-Pioneer honorable mention as a punter, making 55 boots for a 38.2 average. He was the leading scorer with 44 points on three field goals and 35 extra points. Mitch Rasmussen (Delta Omicron '08) also saw action as a kicker.

Quarterback Casey Brockman (Epsilon Lambda '09) of Murray State earned All-Ohio Valley Conference second team. honors after starting the last six games of the season. He hit 213 of 320 for 2,442 yards and 15 scores while rushing for 292 yards and seven TDs. Versus Missouri State, he was national Player of the Week after completing 32 of 41 for 570 yards and seven scores, the top total in NCAA FCS competition. Brockman also threw for 497 yards, three scores on a 38 of 57 performance against Austin Peay and hit 41 of 48 for 318 yards and three scores versus Eastern Illinois. Also named to the All-OVC second team was kicker James Esco (Florida State, Delta Lamba '09) who transferred to Jacksonville State and was the top scorer (80 points) for the 9-3 FCS playoff squad. He connected on 13 field goals and 41 extra points with his two longest boots of 44 and 45 yards versus Mississippi.

Five Pikes contributed to the **Central Arkansas** 7-4 season. Defensive end Trey
Lippe (*Epsilon Phi '10*) gained All-Southland
Conference honorable mention after forcing
four fumbles and ranking sixth with 45













linemen Jared Tavernier (Mu '08), Andrew Newton (Mu '08), James Festa (Mu '10) and Andrew Williams (Mu '10). Linebacker Brian Fercho (Epsilon Iota '09) played in nine games for the 9-3 Southeast Missouri State FCS playoff team.

Running back Josh Flores (Gamma Epsilon '08) played in 11 games for **Utah**

State. Adam Gaston (*Delta Theta '09*) was the **Arkansas State** deep snapper for the fourth year and teammate
Graham Bates (*Delta Theta '09*) posted 11 tackles. Alex
Chace (*Eta Omicron '07*) handled deep snapping duties
again for **Louisiana-Monroe**. Seeing duty as a kicker for **Pennsylvania** again was Trevor Charlston (*Beta Pi '08*).
Squad members at their schools were running back Curtis
Knox (*Epsilon Pi '10*) of 6-5 **Sam Houston State** and Chaz
Hope (*Zeta Tau '08*) of **Eastern Kentucky**.

Seeing kicking duty for the 11-4 **Delta State** NCAA Division II playoff squad was Matt Dean (*Zeta Beta '07*) who scored 41 points on six field goals and 23 extra points.



stops. Running back Anthony Blackmon (Epsilon Phi '10) was named to the Southland All-Academic team but missed five games with a knee injury. Defensive end Kit Coleman (Epsilon Phi '08) was in on 18 tackles with two

sacks. Offensive lineman Joe Lehockey (Epsilon Phi '08) played 11 games while tight end Josh Ragland (Epsilon Phi '10) appeared in 10 contests. Running back Brian Mack (Lambda Theta '09) was second in rushing for 10-1 Dayton with 411 yards and seven TDs. Offensive tackle Jonathan Landry (Lambda Upsilon '10) gained All-Southland Conference honorable mention for McNeese State.

Second year head coach **Harold Nichols** (*Presbyterian*, *Mu'88*) had 29 Pikes on his **Presbyterian** squad. Among the leading players were tight end Robert Bumgarner (*Mu'07*), who had 12 receptions for 127 yards; kicker Cam Miller (*Mu'08*), who scored 47 points on seven FGs and 26 extra points; defensive end Iouli Bourroughs (*Mu'09*), with 27 tackles; defensive end Brian Leonardi (*Mu'09*), defensive back Jarrod Watts (*Mu'08*) plus offensive

Earning All-Lone Star Conference North Division second team honors was running back Marcus Graham (Theta Xi '09) of Texas A&M-Commerce. He led in rushing with 815 yards on 173 attempts, scored seven touchdowns and caught 13 passes. Teammate Leonard Jackson (Theta Xi '10) had 19 tackles and forced two fumbles from his defensive back post. Defensive tackle Floyd Wafer (Epsilon Omega '09) played in nine games for East Central. Quarterback Carlos Gonzales (Florida International, Kappa Gamma '09) transferred and saw action for the 8-2 Bridgewater College team. Another transfer, Eric Honig (Florida International, Kappa Gamma '08) was a good receiver for William Jewell College, catching 14 passes for 113 yards.

Linebacker Ben Robinson (Lambda Sigma '09) was the top player among nine Pikes on the Trinity University team. He earned All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference second team honors after posting 76 tackles (12.5 for losses), running back two interceptions for TDs and recovering two fumbles. Center Robert Parker (Lambda Sigma '09) earned All-SCAC honorable mention and quarterback Robert Davidson (Lambda Sigma '09) hit 30 of 67 for 391 yards and four scores. Wide receiver Riley Walker (Lambda Sigma '10) caught 11 passes for 157 yards and Kyle Garoni (Lambda Sigma '09) saw action at offensive guard. Others seeing action for Trinity were kick holder Nick Grasshoff (Lambda Sigma '10), defensive end Greg Kerr (Lambda Sigma '09), who had 25 tackles, and defensive back Dustin Nelson (Lambda Sigma '09). Jamie Swindle (Eta Sigma '10) of West Georgia had six punts for a 35.5 average.

Five Pikes contributed to the successful 7-3 Millsaps season. Offensive guard Will Chandler (Alpha Iota '08) gained All-SCAC honorable mention and was joined on the line by guard James Tryforos (Alpha Iota '08) and tight end Tony Bellan (Alpha Iota '09), who caught seven passes. Linebacker Brent Jerrell (Alpha Iota '09) was in on 30 stops, deflected four balls and picked off two passes. Lineman Randy Thackrey (Alpha Iota '09) had eight starts, 13 tackles and two sacks. Offensive lineman Grant Walthall (Iota Delta '08) played in nine games for 6-4 Rose-Hulman. Seeing action for North Carolina-Pembroke were tight end Cody Harrington (Eta Omega '10) quarterback Teland Todd (Eta Omega '10), offensive lineman Brandon Huckaby (Eta Omega

'10) and defensive end Owen Thomas (Eta Omega '10), who had 17 tackles, seven quarterback hurries and three sacks.

Since retiring from his highly successful career as a head coach, Bobby Bowden (Samford, Alpha Pi '49) has been in the public eye this past fall nearly as much as he was while on the Florida State sidelines. His autobiography, Called to Coach, published by Howard Books, was on bookshelves nationally during the college season and provided his reflections on life, faith and football (see page 73). In recent months, Bowden was chosen by the American Football Coaches Association as 2011 winner of the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award, which he received at the January 11th AFCA Awards Luncheon in Dallas. The Stagg Award, first presented in 1940, goes to an individual, group or institution whose services have been outstanding in the advancement of the best interests of football. Bowden is still seen frequently on Discover Card TV commercials and received the American Heart Association's 2011 Paul "Bear" Bryant Lifetime Achievement Award at the Bryant College Football Coaching Awards dinner on January 18th in Houston.

Goalie Pat McNamee (Alpha Kappa '08) of **Missouri S&T** was named to the NSCAA All-American second team after winning Great Lakes Valley Conference Defensive Player of the Year honors. Playing 1,684 minutes over 16 games, he posted a school record nine shutouts, allowed just 11 goals



for a goals against average of 0.67 and posted 60 saves. The team's top scorer with 13 points (five goals, three assists) was co-captain Sam Shaffer (Alpha Kappa '08), who scored three game-winning goals. Key regulars were Kenny Gravlin (Alpha Kappa '08), who started 20 games; Ryan Muich (Alpha Kappa '09), with 20 starts; and J.J. Bilyeau (Alpha Kappa '09). Goalie Will Dorrance (Pi '08) of the 8-7-2 **Washington & Lee** squad posted a 0.76 goals against average on seven goals, made 32 saves and had three shutouts.

Chris Bevill (*Theta Omega '08*) of **California-Davis** started all 18 games and was named to the All-Big West Conference second team. Scoring five points for the 8-6-4 **California-San Diego** squad was Kian Malek (*Kappa Phi '11*). Jamie LaFleur (*Delta Alpha '09*) had seven starts for **George Washington. Trinity University**



Now in his first season at **Houston** is **James Dickey** (Central Arkansas, Epsilon Phi '74). He was head coach at **Texas Tech** from 1991 to 2001, then went to **Oklahoma State** as an assistant coach before taking the Houston job. As we go to press, his team is 11-6 this winter. Former NBA player **Fred Hoiberg** (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '91) has had a successful start (14-5) at his alma mater after spending the 2009-10 season as Vice President of Basketball Operations with the NBA Minnesota Timberwolves. His return to **Iowa State** has revitalized the program and was discussed in a Wall Street Journal story on January 11th.

The most successful of the three Pike head coaches who are back this winter is 12 year mentor **Kevin Stallings** (*Purdue, Beta Phi '80*) who has led his **Vanderbilt** squad to a 13-4 start following a 24-9 record during the 2009-10 season. Currently in his fifth year as head coach at **SMU** is **Matt Doherty** (*SMU*, *Beta Zeta '06*), whose Mustangs


TRACK & FIELD

BASEBALL

Returning to the diamond again are two of the college game's leading head coaches. Last year in his 32nd season at **Florida State** as head coach, **Mike Martin** (*Florida State*, *Delta Lambda '06*) took the 48-20

Seminoles to their 14th College World Series appearance. He became the third coach to surpass 1,600 career wins and is now 1,631-558-4. Wichita State head man **Gene Stephenson** (*Missouri*, *Alpha Nu '64*) won his 20th Missouri Valley Conference regular season title and finished with a 41-19 mark. He went past the 1,700 wins mark in April and now has 1,724 career victories.

Back on the playing field this spring for NCAA Division I clubs are **Appalachian State** outfielder Jack Myers (*Iota Psi '08*), who batted .345 (20 of 58) in 31 contests; infielder J.K. Dykes (*Gamma Xi '10*) of **Washington State**, a .308 hitter in 14 games; outfielder Robbie Stahl (*Delta Lambda '08*) of **Florida State**; and pitcher Cody Powell (*Delta Theta '07*) of **Arkansas State**. Infielder Daniel Ross (*Zeta Rho '08*) hopes to see more action for Division II

North Dakota after missing most of the 2010 season with an injury.

Four outstanding players return to the 32-9 Trinity squad which played in the NCAA Division III tournament. Outfielder Nick Pappas (Lambda Sigma '09) was named to the ABCA Division III All-Western Region second team, the All-SCAC first team and the SCAC All-Tournament team. He batted .416 (69 of 166), drove in 58 runs while scoring 48 and collected 12 doubles, four triples, seven home runs and 14 stolen bases. All-SCAC catcher/first baseman Kyle Felix (Lambda Sigma '09) hit .426 (49 of 115) with 42 runs, 41 RBI, 13 doubles and six homers. Kevin Calbick (Lambda Sigma '09) was a .363 hitter (42 of 116) with 39 runs, 32 RBI, nine doubles and two homers. Pitcher Noah Solomon (Lambda Sigma '09) posted a 4-3 record in 12 games with 44 strikeouts in 44.1 innings pitched.

Infielder/DH Joe Mangum (Eta Omega '10) of North Carolina-Pembroke returns after batting .348 (47 of 135) with 38 runs scored, 34 RBI, 13 doubles and two four-baggers. Outfielder Kyle LaVigne (Gamma Tau '09) of Rensselaer is back after



During fall rounds, he was second on the Seminoles squad with a 73.0 average over 12 rounds, including a 68. Wesley Graham (*Delta Lambda '10*) also helped lead the Seminoles to third place at the NCAA tournament and tied for second (205) at the NCAA Central Region event. He averaged 72.73 over 24 spring rounds, followed by a 73.73 average over 12 fall rounds. His career best round is 67 and his best 36-hole total is 135.

During the 2010 spring season, Nick Wilson (Eta Omicron '08) of Louisiana-Monroe played all nine tournaments and shot the squad's three lowest 36-hole totals. His best finish was a tie for fourth at HBU's Intercollegiate meet and he averaged 77.58 over 24 rounds. In fall 2010 play, he averaged 75.50 with a career low of 70 in his three-round total (216) at the Carter Plantation Intercollegiate. Rensselaer captain Eric Fritz (Gamma Tau '08) had a best fall finish of 28th at the NYU/Manhattanville Invitational and played


TENNIS


LACROSSE

OTHER SPORTS





Veteran pitcher **Seth Greisinger** (Virginia, Alpha '95) has pitched in Japan since 2007 but had arm problems in 2009-10 with the Yomiui Giants. He had minor elbow surgery last May but struggled with a

comeback, pitching just four games before being taken off the active roster. He agreed to a reduced salary with Yomiuri and hopes the arm trouble is behind him this year. Greisinger won a bronze Olympic medal for the US in 1996 before being in and out of major league baseball between 1998 and 2005. Outfielder **D'Vontrey Richardson** (Florida State, Delta Lambda '07) was in the Milwaukee Brewers organization last year and played 132 games for the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers of the Midwest League. He batted .243 (127 of 522) with 78 runs, 28 doubles, eight triples, seven homers, 58 RBI and 17 stolen bases.

Pike can boast two Heisman Trophy winners – **Frank Sinkwich** (Georgia, Alpha Mu '41) of the Georgia Bulldogs and **Gino Torretta** (Miami, Gamma Omega '91) of the Miami Hurricanes – among the long roster of stars who wear the Shield & Diamond. They also include NBA champion **Horace Grant** (Clemson, Eta Alpha '91), World Golf Hall of Fame member **Hubert Green** (Florida State, Delta Lambda '65), legendary distance runner **Steve Prefontaine** (Oregon, Gamma Pi '70) and many, many more.

Varsity athletes have always been influential in the leadership and advancement of our Fraternity. Alpha Eta Chapter at the University of Florida has initiated more Brothers than any other chapter. That chapter was founded in 1904 when the new Head Football Coach at the University of Florida surrounded himself with a carefully selected assembly of

young men. They gathered for the purpose of founding a chapter of **Coach Marvin O. Bridges'** college fraternity. Bridges, a 1903 initiate of Rho Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha at Cumberland University, is the father of modern football at the University. That night of November 17th, 1904, Coach Bridges inspired the eleven undergraduates who were to form the core of Alpha Eta Chapter. The fellowship included Bridges' two younger brothers **Bernard Bridges** and **Benjamin Bridges**. Bernard was captain of Florida's football team.

Varsity athletes at small schools are very often eager to pledge fraternities. They want the complete social experience and fellowship of student life at the college. Varsity athletes at larger universities also pledge fraternities, and probably more would pledge if they were recruited.



Because they are disciplined and focused, student-athletes tend to prefer joining good fraternities. Thus, one of the advantages of including them in your membership is the perception that yours is a good fraternity. They do join. Football players are fraternity members at 2009 National Champion Alabama. They are also members at 2010 National Champion Auburn, and runnerup Oregon as well as 2010 Cinderella TCU. They join fraternities at venerable academic strongholds like Stanford, MIT, Northwestern, Duke and Vanderbilt, as well as the massive Division I powers like Texas, Oklahoma and Nebraska. Football players are especially in evidence among fraternities at Ivy League schools like Yale and Brown, Colgate, Harvard, Penn and Dartmouth.

A 2009 feature in the Yale student newspaper titled "Why Yale Athletes Join Frats" cited testimonies from varsity athletes in a wide range of sports who cited the attraction of bonding, and the opportunity to make friends outside the narrow confines of their specific teams. As many as one-third to one-half the varsity athletes at Yale join fraternities.



How Student-Athletes Can Benefit the Chapter


Pi Kappa Alpha should strive to seek out and recruit the best men available, men of ambition and accomplishment. Proud and competitive chapters will rush men from all areas of the campus community, including varsity teams. Athletes add to the diversity of strengths in the chapter.

They add to the prestige of the chapter.

One value of pledging athletes in high profile sports is that they can carry your letters and your name to places where other members can never go. This is especially true of football because they play in front of a large audience, often on television.

Our Gamma Omega Chapter at the University of Miami has routinely included varsity athletes among its membership for fifty years. In 2003, Sports Illustrated devoted an entire page to the story of three starting offensive linemen and Pikes who played for the Hurricanes. The article mentions the three being required to memorize the Preamble.

Many high profile individuals joined fraternities in college. Famous actors like



Burt Reynolds, John Wayne and Robert Redford along with past Presidents Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan were all college athletes and fraternity men. Both Archie Manning and his son Eli joined Sigma Nu at Ole Miss.

They possess qualities of a great member.

Another value varsity athletes bring to the chapter is their tendency to be highly disciplined and successful individuals. They are often natural leaders and bring that leadership potential to the chapter. In many chapters, varsity athletes serve as officers and participate in routine chapter activities. Excellent Pike chapters seek out ambitious men who are active in student organizations. It's natural to expand that search to recruit accomplished men on university athletic teams.

They create a new pipeline for recruitment.

Once the chapter recruits members from a varsity team, it allows them to create a new recruitment pipeline that will bring more new members each year. Much like when a chapter can depend on quality new members each year from certain high schools, cities, and clubs. As alumni, these men tend to be active contributors in the same proportion as other Brothers. If they enjoy a good experience in the chapter they are just as likely to give back both time and money to support the chapter.

How to Recruit Athletes

It helps to develop a tradition of routinely having varsity athletes among the members. And, you have to be vigilant in making sure that tradition stays alive; it's easy to let it slip away. There are no secrets, only the application of common sense. Now that we know why we want to recruit athletes, let's examine on how to recruit them;

Make recruiting athletes a priority.

The rush chairman and rush committee should know that they are expected to bring in a few varsity and club athletes as part of every pledge class. The chapter members must understand that the varsity sport is the athlete's first priority at school.

Don't ask athletes to recruit other athletes.

Doing so implies that you are interested only in pledging a player per se, rather

The alumni not only received tailgate spots, but they were able to fundraise over \$2,000 to be used toward chapter operations. In December 2010, a very successful Christmas luncheon was held at a local

country club with alumni, giving the active chapter an opportunity to spend time with their prestigious alumni while raising money to go towards scholarships for brothers who have demonstrated leadership, mentorship, and excellent scholarship during the past year.

Within the chapter, an increased focus on standards and academic advising by alumni and campus advocates has yielded a chapter GPA of 3.18, by far the highest in recent history and a year over year increase of a quarter point.

The chapter has excelled in their service to the Ohio State Community, averaging 22 hours per man of service in the last year and founding the Greek Community Block Watch at the school. Pike's Rivalry Run Against Cancer this fall raised \$4,509 for the American Cancer Society by running a game ball for the OSU/Michigan football game from Ann Arbor to Columbus. The 187 mile relay race is a collaborative effort with Beta Tau Chapter at Michigan.

Alpha Rho Chapter also excels in campus leadership, boasting a 100% campus involvement rate, and members serve on IFC, student government, and various club executive boards.




where each Greek organization on campus enters its most talented singer in the competition. Proceeds from the event go to MDA to assist with the scientific research for muscular dystrophy.





The men have good things to report in both athletics and academics; Toledo Pikes indoor soccer team won their third consecutive championship, and



PIKE WELCOMES 250,000th INITIATE

Epsilon Chapter at Virginia Tech has the honor of welcoming a milestone member.

When the year 1868 came to a close, ten men were initiated in Pi Kappa Alpha. Through 143 years of perseverance, leadership, and an unwavering pursuit of greatness, the Fraternity that started its very first year with ten has now grown officially to 250,000.

The milestone number was reached on January 22, 2011 during the initiation of Epsilon Chapter's pledge class. When Chapter President Carter Gradwell (*Epsilon '08*) initiated Virginia Tech freshman Forrest Smith, he was officially the 250,000th man to be given the privilege of wearing the letters ПKA across his chest.

With the 200,000th brother initiated in April 2000, the next 50,000 initiates have been gained in less time than any other group of 50,000 in the history of Pi Kappa Alpha. Going from the original six to 50,000 took 89 years; going from 200,000 to 250,000 took less than 11. Each 50,000 initiate mark has been achieved in less time than the one before; including 150,000 initiates in the last 35 years – an outstanding average of 4,286 men per year.

This consistency over such a long period of time is truly an extraordinary feat. However, it is not by chance that PIKE is in the position it is in today. It is because the values instilled by the Founders of the Fraternity have remained in the hearts of the leaders and at the base of their decision making. Different times present different challenges, but one thing remains constant – the non-stop compulsion for improvement.

Evidence of this goes back more than 100 years. In March 1902, riding the wave of PIKE's first great expansion push in 1901, the chief executive of the Fraternity – at the time called the "Grand Princeps" – J. Pike Powers (Virginia, Alpha 1895) had this mindset: "Our Fraternity is better and larger today than ever before. But we must not stop here, not yet. Twenty-one chapters now, next year we may have 35 on our roll."

Fast forward 77 years and 155 chapters and colonies later to 1979, another zenith



for the state of Pi Kappa Alpha. Having just entered record-setting numbers for pledges, initiations, and overall success, Executive Director Pat Halloran (Nebraska-Omaha, Delta Chi '62) wrote the following in the September issue of the Shield & Diamond: "Pi Kappa Alpha is a vital, progressive organization that seeks to continue to improve and meet the needs of its membership. Pi Kappa Alpha continues to demand progress through creativity, and it

will not accept mediocrity – only success."

Whether it was the turn of the century or the beginning of the 1880s, success did not cause complacency within the leadership of Pike. The greater Pi Kappa Alpha has become, the more it has pushed to the next level.

Today, in addition to 250,000 lifetime initiates, Pi Kappa Alpha boasts 230 chapter and colonies. The constant push for improvement is not lost on current Executive Vice President and CEO Justin Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96). "PIKE just concluded its best year ever," Buck says. "It is an unprecedented time in its history due in large part to the emphasis the Fraternity and its chapters have placed on quality growth over the past 25 years. I am confident that PIKE will put in the work that is necessary to make the next 25 years even better, and set a new standard for excellence and growth."

Buck recognizes that this way of thinking has trickled down to the chapter level as well, and is apparent in the story of 250,000th initiate Forrest Smith and Epsilon Chapter. Smith, originally from Fairfax, Virginia, brings the perspective of someone on the cusp of a lifetime of brotherhood. "When I found out I was the 250,000th initiate," Smith says, "it really hit

Smith was the perfect choice in the eyes of Chapter President Gradwell. "Forrest was the unspoken leader of his pledge class; he was the heart. You can't ask for a better pledge, friend, and brother. Looking at the future of our chapter, we couldn't be happier to have him represent us and all of PIKE.







2011 CHAPTER EXECUTIVES CONFERENCE

A weekend of education, brotherhood and fun sharpens the skills of our chapters' leaders.

At the 2011 Chapter Executives Conference, attendees were urged to reach their full potential through service, integrity and positive image. On January 6-9, 2011, Pi Kappa Alpha members assembled in Memphis, Tennessee for the annual Chapter Executives Conference (CEC). Presidents, treasurers and recruitment chairmen from over 160 chapters and colonies listened to high-caliber leadership presentations concerning the evolution of the modern-day Fraternity. In addition to a powerful educational summit weekend, these brothers enjoyed luxurious, Forbes four-star, first-class hospitality at the Peabody Hotel and celebrated Elvis' 76th birthday on famous Beale Street, just two blocks away.

Four hundred and eighty-four undergraduates began the new decade by committing three days to hone their leadership skills at the Chapter Executives Conference, at the world renowned Peabody Hotel in Memphis. This delegation, intent on investing in their own personal development as well as their chapter's or colony's future, composed the largest CEC to date; a promising sign for 2011 and Pi Kappa Alpha. During their stay, participants listened to educational seminars concerning the usual challenges of creating successful fraternity programming as well as new opportunities generated by a rapidly changing student population and the incorporation of computer technology.

Following registration and room checkin, CEC weekend began with dinner and encouraging remarks by Pi Kappa Alpha Executive Vice President Justin A. Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon Iota '96). As he introduced the staff of the Fraternity, he welcomed the attendees and challenged them to take advantage of all their resources, especially each other. After dinner, many heeded his advice at the regional launch meetings led by each region's respective chapter consultant. Launch meetings provide a familiar arena for many attendees who restart conversations with old friends. They also provide an opportunity for members and chapter consultants to review the conference's itinerary and announce regional updates.

Thursday night concluded with a motivational presentation by former University of Minnesota mascot and Pike brother Ross Bernstein (Minnesota, Beta Chi '88). Bernstein's presentation centered on the code of integrity between athletes and their ability to inspire others to follow suit. He encouraged the captivated audience to leave their own positive legacy on their respective campuses. (See additional story on page 52).

Friday morning began with a session showcasing incidents of Greeks creating negative publicity, responsible for corroding the image of the fraternity man. Buck led this risk awareness seminar, positing the end of Fraternity life as we know it because of hazing and its repercussions. This highly informative program presented an outsider's perspective regarding case-studies involving hazing. Undergraduates left understanding their role and responsibility for promoting a positive image for Greek life on their campuses.

A presentation by PIKE's newest technology partner, OmegaFi, followed. Effective organization is the backbone of a chapter's ability to hold its members accountable to their own standards. Utilizing OmegaFi and the personal internet portals it provides, chapters and colonies

are now able to collect membership dues, track membership records and organize capital campaigns more efficiently. This technological leap will streamline many time consuming tasks, making it easier to focus effort on other endeavors.

Later in the day, many undergraduate members took the opportunity to visit the Fraternity's Memorial Headquarters, dedicated to the military brothers of Pi Kappa Alpha who have fought for our freedom. As students walked into the grand rotunda, they gazed upon the portraits of the six Founders painted by renowned artist Paul Penczer (Memphis, Delta Zeta '94). Walking through the Headquarters, they had the opportunity to see the artifacts kept in the Hart Museum as well as staff members' work quarters. At the conclusion of the tour, members looked forward to attending the Utah Jazz vs Memphis Grizzles game at the FedEx Forum. Over 250 undergraduates watched the Grizzles win 110-99. Others who did not attend were able to enjoy the festivities on Beale Street.

The final day of the CEC commenced with an informative presentation by International Historian Dr. Jerome Reel (Tulane, Eta '57), concerning PIKE's history and traditions. This history lesson was later complemented by a mock initiation, broken into multiple parts in order to explain the significance and proper procedure of each section. In addition to ritual lessons, the three different tracks for presidents, treasurers and rush chairmen culminated on Saturday, leaving only two programs of the CEC to finish: success meetings with respective chapter consultants and a final recruitment presentation. The success meetings offered an opportunity for undergraduates from the each region to share different insights from the weekend. They generated new ideas on how to take in the weekend's information and diffuse it to their own chapter members. During the staple final presentation, Recruitment Advisor Tom Olsen (Illinois, Beta Eta '02) challenged the audience to break from their customary traditions and try new practices. The biggest challenge presented to the attendees was to capture the message for their chapters and expect all members of the chapter to be engaged in recruitment.

At the 2011 CEC Leadership Banquet on Saturday night, International President Kevin E. Virta (Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83) delivered a blueprint for creating an

abundance mentality for great expectation. Virta's message highlighted the responsibility of individuals to provide service to those in need in the 21st century. Only by providing service can members be positive influences in society. He cautioned, however, that our motivation must be authentic. If our motivation for service and influence is fueled by self-aggrandizement, we will not achieve our fullest potential. Virta's speech complemented Bernstein's earlier message concerning legacy. Both speakers challenged the audience to leave a positive legacy that not only motivates but also inspires others.



PLAY TO YOUR PASSION

Sound Advice From A Rodent-Turned Writer...

"Find a job you love and you'll never work a day in your life." Passion. This is a word Ross Bernstein (Minnesota, Beta Chi'88) talks about... a lot. He's a bundle of energy and it's pretty obvious that he loves what he does for a living. Ross, a Pike from the University of Minnesota (Beta Chi'88), is a full time motivational speaker and best-selling author of nearly 50 sports books. Ross was the keynote speaker at the Chapter Executives Conference this January in Memphis and he had some solid advice for the active members in attendance: "Play to your passion." In other words, do what you love and love what you do.

Ross uses inspirational sports stories to energize and connect his audiences, and his program, The Champion's Code: Life Lessons of Values and Integrity from the Sports World to the Business World, highlights the differences between athletes and champions. Ross spent five years researching and interviewing more than 500 professional athletes for his nationally best-selling series of "Code" books, which chronicle the unwritten rules in sports, and he uses that wealth of information to educate, enlighten and entertain his audiences - challenging them to be more ethical and accountable both personally as well as professionally. Using huge photos, which were tied into stories, Ross explained how champions are different, and about how they have a very unique DNA. He talked about how champions weren't necessarily people who





had won championships either, but rather it was the way that they worked harder than everybody else; the way that they treated their teammates with respect; the way that they led by example; the way that they sacrificed and put the team first; and the way that they acted like professionals — even when nobody was watching. He then related it all back to the students by talking about their social media strategy, on-campus reputation, academics, and community service. Judging by the standing ovation he got following his presentation, by all accounts his message was received loud and clear.

We had a chance to sit down and talk to Ross to find out just what makes this guy tick, and as you are about to read — his story of being able to parlay his passion into a career he adores is nothing short of fascinating. Here's Ross in his own words...

t's like the old cliché goes, "Find a job you love and you'll never work a day in your life." I couldn't agree more. Well, for me, my passion is sports. Playing sports, watching sports, talking about sports; as a kid and even now as an adult that's my vice: my obsession. In fact, my dream as a kid was to play hockey at the University of Minnesota. I grew up in this little town in southern Minnesota along the Iowa border, Fairmont, where hockey was almost nonexistent - the antithesis of northern Minnesota. where they pull kids out of the womb by their skate blades. I had a passion for the game though, just loved it.

and wound up taking a leap of faith by trying out for the top ranked Golden Gophers as a walk-on defenseman. Sadly, however, after a brief cup of coffee... I got cut. My dream was shattered and I was pretty devastated. It turned out that there was another roster spot that was open though, one not quite as sexy as "All-American Defenseman," but pretty darn close in my book: team mascot — "Goldy the Gopher." There were two criteria for the job: you had to be a pretty good skater and you had to be a complete moron. I apparently fit on both accounts and got the gig. Go figure.

For the next three years I entertained the masses at Mariucci Arena and truly had a ball. It was awesome. The collective blood-alcohol in that old dump was about 7.3, so needless to say pretty much anything I did was perceived as absolutely hilarious. Again, go figure. During that time I was really active in the Fraternity. Our house was on frat-row just a block away from the arena, so I would just throw that smelly costume on and go to work, it was so much fun. The games were always on Friday and Saturday nights, which just so happened to be the very same nights we would have gigantic

we would have gigantic parties at the house, so it was always a pretty neat feeling to be able to walk home after the game and join the masses having a great time out on the front porch along University Avenue.




In January 2011 the old guys pounded the young guys at Beta Chi Chapter (Minnesota) in the third annual "Pike Boot Hockey Classic", which was then followed by refreshments and networking.

Joining a house at a place like the University of Minnesota was a big deal. The school is located right in the middle of downtown Minneapolis and on top of that there are upwards of 50,000 students on campus. It's a pretty big place and I wanted to make it a lot smaller by being able to hang out with guys who were into the same stuff I was into. My older brother, Andy '86, was involved in recolonizing our chapter in the mid-1980s and he encouraged me to join. It was one of the best decisions I have ever made in my life. He later initiated me when he was the chapter president and that was definitely one of my coolest memories as a Pike. My parents were both in houses at Minnesota and my wife, Sara, was an Alpha Gam there as well, so being Greek is definitely something I am extremely proud of. We met on Spring Break in 1991 down in Mazatlan (midnight at Joe's Oyster Bar to be exact ...) and it was love at first sight. I also remember hanging out on the beach next to that big beautiful Pike flag, a beacon for all the brothers from

across the country to come over and mingle. The stories that were told, simply epic. Believe it or not, many of those guys I met down there I am still friends with today.

Being a Pike meant everything to me. I mean I really got into it. I was the rush chairman for over a year, served as the social chairman, and even started the annual Dream Girl pageant. Ahh, the memories. I remember when we won the Smythe in 1989 and attending the (CEC) national conference in Memphis that year, what an unbelievable time that was. We had set a goal to win it and we did, it was so rewarding. I eventually ran for president my senior year but lost, which was pretty tough to swallow. Ironically, shortly after that I was approached by a local publisher who told me that he wanted to write a book about all the trouble I had gotten into as "Goldy the Gopher." (Yes, I had offended and maimed a few Wisconsin fans along the way... what can I say?) Anyway, I told him I was flattered but had to respectfully decline. I mean other than my grandma who would want to read this? Then I started thinking. I was a fifth year senior at this point and dad's cash was drying up fast. My two older brothers had

already received their Ivy League MBA's out at Dartmouth and I was feeling the specter of the real world closing in on me.

I thought maybe this whole "book thing" wasn't such a bad idea after all? I saw an opportunity. What if I wrote about the history and heroes of Gopher hockey from the unique perspective of a mischievous rodent? Hev, that's not bad. Now, despite the fact that I had barely read any books at this stage of my life, especially college text books... trust me, I somehow felt more than qualified to write and publish my own book. So, I took another leap of faith and told my parents that I had "other plans" for my ear-marked graduate school money. All I can remember was a long pause, followed by the word "disappointment," "failure," and a whole bunch of other four-letter expletives mixed in. Luckily, giving me up for adoption at that point wasn't a realistic option for them, although I'm sure it crossed their minds. With that, I dove in and wrote my first book, appropriately titled: Gopher Hockey by the Hockey Gopher. Before long I was getting calls from book stores wanting me to come in to do signings,

followed by TV and radio stations who were inviting me to come on the air to tell stories. It was amazing. The book became a regional best-seller, something like 15,000 copies sold that Christmas, and just like that, I was officially an author. Crazy.

Getting on TV, that really motivated me. I talk a lot about motivation in my speaking programs today and I encourage people to make it personal. For me, when my mom would call me and tell me that she saw me on the news, and that I looked cute... that really rang my bell. It rang my bell back in 1992 and it still rings my bell nearly 20 years later. THAT motivates me, so I do it over and over again. In fact, I can't wait for Christmas every vear so I can get back on TV and get that phone call from mom. It's an amazing feeling. I know that I have to earn it every year though, which drives me and forces me to be accountable. So, what motivates you?

Since then I have penned nearly 50 books, but I learned some pretty valuable life lessons from that first one - things that have kept me in the game all these years later. For starters, I learned about the virtues of making lemonade out of lemons. Believe me, I would much rather have made the Gopher hockey team as a player versus a cheerleader, but I rolled with it and turned it into something positive. Being Goldy still remains my "signature story" and is a big part of my brand. Secondly, I learned about the power of the media. When I wrote the book, not only did I interview more than 100 players and coaches, I also talked to countless members of the local media. By including them in the process they became invested in the book. As a result, I wound up doing about 50 TV and radio interviews and also scored dozens of printed reviews in local papers and magazines. Today I am an expert in guerilla marketing, which is huge for the success of my business. Lastly, I learned about the power of karma. I remember sending signed copies of the book to everyone who I had interviewed, thanking them and offering them more free of charge for their charities. Before long the phone started ringing and all of those

interviewees were asking what they could do to help me out. I was blown away. Now I give away thousands of books to various charitable causes and celebrity golf tournaments every year. Books have become my currency of choice. What's your currency? Think about it. Time, expertise, stuff... what can you barter to get ahead in the new economy as you prepare for your first job? Good karma for me invariably turns into more book opportunities and more speaking engagements. Be a giver, not a

As I reflect back on what the Fraternity has meant to me all these years later I can't help but be thankful and grateful. What a profound influence it has had on me. It's emotional for me, it really is. I also

taker. Nobody likes takers.

consider myself to be extremely lucky. Living in Minnesota I am blessed to be able to say that I still get to hang out with and stay connected to upwards of a couple hundred "old" Pikes. Because the University is located in a large metropolitan area, the vast majority of us all still live here.

Our families are here. our kids go to school here, and our businesses are here. From fantasy football to pick-up hockey leagues to Vikings season tickets - we are all still living the dream. It's wonderful. So. there you have it:

using your passion to make your living and to stay connected to those who matter most. Hopefully some sound advice from a passionate rodentturned-writer. Who'd-a thunk?

Ross Bernstein is the best-selling author of nearly 50 sports books and has appeared on thousands of television and radio programs over his career, including CNN, ESPN and NPR as well as on the covers of the Wall Street Journal, New York Times and USA Today. 



than the individual. Your rush chairman should ask current brothers who are varsity athletes for names of good potential members, and then send non-athlete Brothers to meet them, become friends with them and rush them. From time to time, an athlete will emerge who will be interested in rushing other athletes. Let that man emerge naturally.

Recruit athletes as individuals.

They are not interested in joining an, "athletes" fraternity. They join because someone who's not an athlete makes friends with them, and they can escape to the fraternity to get away from the relentless atmosphere around the athlete dorm. When they come to the house, do not talk to them about football/basketball/baseball, etc. They're at your house to get away from that.

Tell the candidate, "We want you because of the man you are. We realize that you have extraordinary demands on you, and we'll do our best to accommodate your schedule, but when you walk through that door leave your helmet behind. Here, you're not a football player; you're a Brother." Many of the men you want will respond well to that approach.

Maintain adaptability in your new member education program.

Remember, they may need special attention or even a special new member program due to the unusual demands athletics makes on their time. Make sure the athletes and the new member educator fully understand the ground rules.

The chapter has to be comfortable with the idea and not view student-athletes as "outsiders". The reality is that varsity athletes cannot always put the time into their new member program and membership that other students can. The chapter has to be willing to accommodate them as necessary, in the new member program and in other areas as well. You'll find that as each athlete makes friends in the chapter, he will become more involved.

Concentrate on freshmen.

The demands of their sport generally are not yet so great, and they may already have some friends from home in your chapter.

Make sure they are making nonathlete friends.

Varsity athletes should make as many non-athlete friends in the chapter as possible. One of the primary attractions of fraternity life, and the reason many athletes join, to get away from the relentless demands of the athletic department and to be treated like a normal student. Strongly encourage them to have a diverse range of friends in the chapter. Even go to the point of assigning individual Brothers to take them under their wing.

You have to be persistent to be successful in your recruiting. Even the Pike chapters that are most prolific in recruiting athletes still miss on a lot of them. You have to accept that you will fail from time to time, but persistence will bring good results.

Pi Kappa Alpha is more successful than any other fraternity at recruiting athletes because we make a point of it, along with also recruiting scholars, leaders and gentlemen. Pike can boast the largest average chapter size among all major fraternities because of our expertise and success in recruitment.

The United States Senate voted on September 29, 2010, and, with unanimous consent confirmed William Charles Killian (Tennessee, Zeta '68) as United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Tennessee. He assumed his duties immediately, taking over the office from Acting U.S. Attorney


CALLED TO COACH

The legendary Bobby Bowden gives fans an inside look into his life and how he became one of college football's most successful coaches.

Bobby Bowden (Samford, Alpha Pi '49) is known as much for his affable charm as he is for his championship teams. Having coached young men in seven decades, he is one of the most successful coaches in major college football history. Bowden guided Florida State University to more than three hundred victories, two national championships, twelve Atlantic Coast Conference titles, finishing in the top five in the country in fourteen straight seasons, and he also led the Seminoles to Bowl Games in twentyeight consecutive seasons during his thirty-four-year tenure. Bowden was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2006.

Since retiring as head football coach at Florida State, Bobby Bowden, a member of Pi Kappa Alpha at Samford, has stayed in the public eve with an autobiography last fall and ongoing appearances in Discover Card TV commercials. On January 11, 2011 at the American Football Coaches annual convention in Dallas, he was awarded the Amos Alonzo Stagg Award for his outstanding service in the best interest of football. A week later on January 18, Bowden received the Paul "Bear" Bryant Lifetime Achievement Award presented by the American Heart Association at the Bryant College Football Coaching Awards dinner. He and his wife of sixty-one years, Ann, live in Tallahassee, Florida.



A FAMILY AFFAIR

The Dorrohs of Louisiana embody the meaning of the word "Legacy".

A family tradition is certainly something to be cherished and enjoyed. In the case of the Dorroh men, Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity has become a beloved tradition and was occasion for a family get together and celebration on November 19, 2010.

On that date, Walter Evans
Dorroh, III, known to his
friends as Evans, became the
first triple legacy in the history
of Zeta Omega Chapter of Pi
Kappa Alpha at the University
of Louisiana-Lafayette. Evans
pledged PIKE in August 2010,
and after an outstanding
pledgeship was initiated along
with 31 other young men at this
outstanding Smythe Award-winning
chapter.

The special thing about this family tradition is that Evans' initiation was attended by his ninety-year-old grandfather, Walter Evans Dorroh, Sr., his father, Walter Evans Dorroh, Jr., and his uncle, William Edward Dorroh. Those three men have a history of service and dedication to Pi Kappa Alpha, to community, and to country that is strong evidence of the type of outstanding man who joins our Fraternity.

Walter Evans Dorroh, Sr. entered LSU as a freshman at age 16. He pledged Pike and worked his way up the leadership ladder to serve as chapter president. During his term as president, he greatly increased the size of the chapter and improved what had been a shaky financial footing. Dorroh, Sr. was a decorated pilot in World War II. He flew 59 B-25 and B-26 missions over North Africa, Italy, and Eastern Europe. After the end of World War II, he returned to North Louisiana and married the late Adrienne Prince Dorroh. Once they settled in Olla,

Louisiana, the couple was blessed with three children, the oldest being Walter Evans Dorroh, Jr.

Walter Jr. pledged PIKE in August 1971, and served Zeta Omega Chapter at what was then USL and now University of Louisiana-Lafayette as treasurer, social chairman, vice president, and president. Under his guidance the chapter grew from less than 20 men to over 40, and became very active in campus activities. Walter Jr. graduated in 1975, attended LSU Law School, and is senior partner of his law firm in Jena, Louisiana. He is also the first assistant district attorney for the 28th Judicial District Court. Walter Jr. married Mary Elizabeth Hudak Dorroh, and the couple was blessed with a son, Evans.

William Edward Dorroh, Walter's younger brother by a year, chose to attend LSU like his dad and, like his father and brother before him, pledged Pi Kappa Alpha. William became the youngest president in the history of Alpha Gamma Chapter. He graduated in 1976 and went straight into the banking business. After a few years of tutoring by Dorroh Sr., he became one of the youngest bank presidents

in the United States at Mansfield Bank and Trust Company. The name of the bank was changed to Community Bank of Louisiana several years ago. He is active in community service and lives with his wife, Katherine, in Shreveport where they have raised four wonderful children.

One might think that
Evans Dorroh has a hard
task to manage, to follow in
the footsteps of the trio just
described. However, it is a safe
bet that Evans is up to the task.
Born in August 1991, Evans
attended Pineville High School
and graduated 7th in a class of
258 with a grade point average

of 4.135. He was active in a veritable laundry list of school activities, and was selected to the National Honor Society. Evans was a champion swimmer, finishing first in district and in regionals in his specialty, the breast stroke. He also swam on the Pineville High medley relay team, an award winning foursome that went to the State finals in that event. Evans brings to Zeta Omega Chapter a history of success in every endeavor he has undertaken.

When asked about his long career and association with the Fraternity, Walter Dorroh, Sr., responded as one might expect him to. "This is a proud day for our family and a great experience. I am so proud of Evans and all that he has accomplished. Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity has meant so much to our family. It benefited me greatly in my college experience and my career. The men that I met at LSU through the Fraternity and the experiences I had in learning to work with others and in getting experience in learning to be responsible and managing the chapter have served me very well in every other endeavor and challenge I have faced during my career. I know that

the Fraternity will be invaluable to Evans and I am very confident he will have the same wonderful experiences and memories that I have enjoyed."

Walter Jr. chimed in at that point. "I really thought this would be a good thing for me to pledge the same fraternity my dad had joined when I first attended USL in 1971. Pop didn't pressure me to do it, but I think he was glad that I did. Like him, I have found my Fraternity experiences to be very enjoyable and very educational. I always thought when I was a young man that I would be very proud to have a son pledge Pike. Having such a wonderful son as Evans pledge a great chapter like Zeta Omega is truly a dream come true. I know that he will be a great asset to the chapter and that he will get terrific life experiences through his association with Pike. I have so many friends from my years with the Fraternity and in the years since then I have continued to interact with them. This is truly a great day in our family."

Not to be left out, brother William responded, "Like my dad and my brother, I love the Fraternity and have had so many great experiences in it. When I was finishing high school. I came to Lafayette and enjoyed a Fraternity party or two with my brother, and that convinced me that I should be a Pike at LSU. I wasn't disappointed. My experiences there have helped me in my career and I remain close to Alpha Gamma Chapter and to the brothers there. both from my era and since then. It makes me very proud and happy to see my nephew joining a great chapter and I feel confident that he will help maintain the standard of excellence that Zeta Omega has enjoyed in the last few years."

Finally, the new initiate got his two cents in. "My dad encouraged me to pledge Pike when I came to Lafayette. I really didn't know anyone when I first got here, but I knew when I first walked into the house that Pike was for me. I was thrilled when I received a bid from Pike, and I am equally thrilled to be an active member of such a terrific

chapter. I am very close to my pledge brothers, and all of the active members have been so good to me. I am looking forward to wonderful experiences during my college years and to life long friendships once I become an alumnus. There is more than a little pressure on me to perform; when I look at my grandfather, my dad, and my uncle, at the things they have accomplished and that their service to the Fraternity, to their church and to their nation and community, I can only be very proud and humble. I hope the Lord blesses and guides me toward being as good a man and as successful as they have been, and especially to be as good a fraternity man and brother to my fellow Pikes as they have been over the years."

What a great tradition the Dorroh men have established over the years in their association with Pi Kappa Alpha. It is a safe bet that in twenty years or so, there will be a Dorroh man following up the family tradition of valuable service to the church, country, community and Fraternity.

News of Bygone Days

125 YEARS AGO – 1886: During these formative years, policies were developed that have continued to motivate the Fraternity: the collegiate and unique quality of membership; the primacy of the legislative body; the responsibility of the alumni to their undergraduate brothers and the openness and high moral activity expected from each chapter.

100 YEARS AGO - 1911: In the chapter letters section of the April 1911 Shield & Diamond, Upsilon Chapter at Alabama Polytechnic Institute wrote: Upsilon, together with the chapters of other fraternities here in Auburn, is endeavoring to perfect the Honor System started last year by Brother W.C. Oliver. Each man in the chapter feels that this system is a legacy that he is proud to protect. Work like that is worth while, and time devoted to it is well spent. When we think of men who have graduated and of what they have left us, the thought should make us try the harder to leave our chapters something that will be a guide to their conduct and an inspiration for their endeavors after we are gone.

We will find the same thing out in life. True men will be trying to leave the world better for its contact with them. If such is to be our policy after graduation, why should we delay putting it into action, when the benefit derived by our fraternity would be so great.

75 YEARS AGO - 1936: In the October 1936 Shield & Diamond, a feature article on a Pike athlete reported: Forrest G. Towns, Alpha-Mu, lanky Georgia track star and end on the football team, one of the outstanding firstplace winners for the United States in the Olympic Games at Berlin in August, helped establish the American team victory by his sensational achievement in the 110-meter high hurdles. In the final he tied the world record and lowered the Olympic record, while in the semifinal heat he set a record for the distance, about 360 feet. An interesting note is that Towns was coached by fellow Pike, Weems O. Baskin, Jr., who was 1923 initiate from Upsilon Chapter.

50 YEARS AGO – 1961: Atlanta area alumni celebrated Founders Day at the Atlanta Athletic Club with 110 alumni and undergradu-

ates from the Peach State's four chapters on March 2. The fact that Honorary Life President Robert A. Smythe was there to deliver a sincere charge to all PiKA's and the fact that Atlanta was once again honored by an appearance by Executive Director Robert L. McLeod made the 93rd anniversary of PiKA a truly meaningful occasion.

25 YEARS AGO - 1986: In the March 1986 Shield & Diamond, The Chaplain's Corner by National Chaplain Rev. Simon A. Simon read in part: Pi Kappa Alpha is a great Fraternity. We have a tremendous history and heritage. Nationally we rank always at or near the top. But none of this matters to our local campuses and communities. What we are nationally has no significance to those who experience only representatives of the National Fraternity, you and me and our local chapters. What matters to them is how they experience us personally, how they see us locally. Image is important because it reflects what we are. What do you and your chapter project to others about Pi Kappa Alpha?

JOHN W. HEIN

Foundation Benefactor and Early Field Secretary Enters Chapter Eternal

Brother John W. Hein (Southern California, Gamma Eta '50) entered Pi Kappa Alpha's Chapter Eternal on January 7, 2011.

A proud veteran, Brother Hein served in the United States Navy during World War II, and thereafter secured his degree from the University of Southern California in 1951. Upon his graduation from USC, Hein joined Pi Kappa Alpha's professional staff, serving as one of its earliest field secretaries (now called chapter consultants) during the mid 1950s.

Brother Hein is remembered most fondly by his peers. Brother David Collins (*Presbyterian, Mu'51*) recalls, "In my tenure with the national fraternity, and the 55 years knowing this man, I can safely and honestly say that John Hein was the epitome of a Fraternity brother. He ranks among the top three or four persons I knew and believed to have the qualifications to be called Mr. IIKA..." Brother Charles Byrd (*Marshall, Delta Iota'52*) commented, "John Hein was the truest and most loyal member that PiKA could ever have. Not only his friends, of whom there were many, but his Fraternity will forever miss him." Brother Stan Love (*Marshall, Delta Iota'51*) added, "John Hein was the perfect role model and a giant among us."

Brother Hein spent the majority of his professional career with the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, rising to achieve senior member status in 1970. But Hein always treasured his service on the Fraternity's professional staff, as evidenced by his most generous lead gift funding of the Foundation's Esactius Scholarship Fund in 2008, which provides a substantial annual scholarship to departing Pi Kappa Alpha staff members returning to school for graduate studies after service on the Fraternity's professional staff. In his own words, Hein commented, "Some of our best and brightest young men forgo more lucrative offers to serve on the Memorial Headquarters staff. In some small way, I hope this scholarship helps reward them for these sacrifices and their exemplary service to ΠKA ."

CLARK MAXWELL, JR. (Florida Southern, Delta Delta '53)

Clark Maxwell, Jr. entered Chapter Eternal on January 18, 2011. He graduated from Florida Southern College in 1956 with a degree in speech and English. After graduation, he served in the United States Army at Fort Benning and in Hawaii. Clark moved to Melbourne in 1959 and worked at Cape Canaveral for Pan Am. His political career began with his election to the Brevard County School Board in 1965, where he served as chairman for seven years. He was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1974 and the Florida Senate in 1978. He also served as the Republican leader for the Florida Senate from 1982-1984. During his legislative tenure, he focused on his areas of expertise including education and finance leaving a lasting legacy in Brevard County and throughout the state. He was appointed executive director of the State Community College System in 1984 and served until his retirement in 1997. In 1992 he received the prestigious Leroy

Collins Award for recognition of his substantial contributions and enrichment within the college system. In addition to the Clark Maxwell Jr. Lifelong Learning Center at Brevard Community College, numerous other facilities were named in his honor. Upon his retirement, he relocated to Palm Coast and enjoyed spending time with his family, and pursuing his love of golf, fishing, hunting and traveling. He is survived by his wife of 26 years, Margo.

THOMAS N. O'DONNELL (Arkansas, Alpha Zeta '54)



Thomas O'Donell entered Chapter Eternal on October 25, 2010. He was 76. Whether it was distributing medications at his

pharmacy in Morrilton or teeing off with former President Bill Clinton, Thomas O'Donell thrived on being social "Even when he'd come to Florida to visit, he'd run into somebody he knew," his younger brother, Jim O'Donell, said. In their youth, the brothers worked at the family business, O'Donell's Gas Station and Garage. "We worked on the cars, changed oil and pumped gas," his brother said, though medicine was Tom's true passion. After graduating from Griffithville High School in 1953, Thomas O'Donell attended the University of Arkansas before transferring to the Arkansas School of Pharmacy - now the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences College of Pharmacy. O'Donell graduated in the late 1950s and began his career at Lyons Drugstore in Lonoke. In 1961, O'Donell served in the 916th Surgical Unit in the U.S. Army Reserve for a year as a pharmacist at Fort Jackson in South Carolina. In 1965, he opened O'Donell's Pharmacy in Morrilton, Arkansas, His son, Bart O'Donell, said he didn't miss a day of work in 34 vears.

A member of the Morrilton Country Club and the Conway Country Club, Thomas O'Donell was an avid golfer. Before Bill Clinton became governor of Arkansas, he and O'Donnell were golf buddies. Thomas O'Donell would often go listen to Clinton's speeches during his campaign for governor and went to Clinton's presidential inauguration as an invited guest. His brother, Jim, said he found a gift from Clinton to Thomas that had a friendly jab. "There's a golf putter from Bill Clinton with a note that said, 'Here's a putter, see if you can do better," Jim O'Donell said.

After retiring in 1999, Thomas O'Donell worked part time, traveling to pharmacies around the area that needed a temporary pharmacist. Throughout the years, Thomas O'Donell was active in the pharmaceutical community serving on the Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy, board of admissions for the UAMS College of Pharmacy and as the past president of the Arkansas Pharmacists Association. He also served as past president of the Morrilton Area Chamber of Commerce and was a member of the Fish Lake Hunting and Fishing Club in Blackwell, the First United Methodist Church in Morrilton and the Searcy Masonic Lodge. He was a 32nd degree Mason. O'Donell was an avid bass fisherman and duck, quail and pheasant hunter. Thomas O'Donell's continuous donations to scholarship funds through the College. of Pharmacy changed the lives of aspiring pharmacists

ROBERT L. PLECKER (Texas Tech, Epsilon Gamma '77)



Robert L. Plecker entered Chapter Eternal on January 2, 2011. He earned a bachelor of arts in business administration from

Texas Tech University. Plecker was an Independent Certified Petroleum Landman, a lifelong Texas Tech fan and supporter. He was a member of First United Methodist Church of Lubbock. He is survived by his mother, daughter, son, and two sisters.

TONY POLYCHRONIS (Utah, Alpha Tau '58)



Tony Polychronis entered Chapter Eternal on November 24, 2010 in Salt Lake City. The youngest of five children, he was big, strong and fierce. He helped his high school win its first

state football championship, and became an all-conference guard at the University of Utah. He played in the Hula Bowl and the Shrine Game, was recruited by the New York Giants and

Oakland Raiders, and played professionally for the Toronto Argonauts. He had throughout his life the presence of a down lineman. Polychronis joined Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity, and defined the spirit of the house. He was smart, funny, irreverent, convivial, and loyal, always ready to stay up until morning and talk with his friends. When he died, old PiKaps circulated an e-mail: "The Great Man is dead." He received a B.A. and M.A. from the U, served in the Peace Corps in Cyprus, coached football at Lompoc High in California, Highland High, the University of Utah, Westminster College, and Boise State University. He sold real estate, and worked for the Salt Lake County Assessor's Office. With the on-air name of "The Old Man," Polychronis hosted the "Bluegrass Express" on Radio KRCL, and became Utah's Bluegrass impresario, promoting concerts, and organizing festivals. As a Ute football fan, he traveled with the team, served as a spotter for Bill Marcroft broadcasts, organized coaches' camps and clinics, and was a founding member of the Crimson Club.

DONALD M. REBER (California State-Sacramento, Theta Tau '53)



Donald M. Reber entered Chapter Eternal on December 27, 2010. He earned a bachelor of science degree from California State University at

Sacramento. Sports were a passion of his: he played ice hockey, was a scuba diver and enjoyed both snow and water skiing. He took plenty of fishing trips with friends throughout California and Alaska. He loved going to Giants and Sharks games. He was a city planner early in his career, first for the City of Martinez, then for the City of Walnut Creek. Reber was recruited to the private sector, working for large corporations directing multi-million-dollar building projects through lengthy permit mazes. He was the real estate investment senior director for

San Francisco-based BRE Properties, Inc. A licensed realtor as well, he was also a talented landscaper, whose beautiful gardens brought joy to family and friends. Reber is survived by his wife, Muna Abed Reber, and their daughters, Tiana and Bianca.

JEFFREY S. ROSENBERG (Cornell, Beta Theta '83)

Jeff "Zulu" Rosenberg entered Chapter Eternal on September 17, 2010, after waging an epic battle with cholangiocarcinoma, a rare form of bile duct cancer. He was surrounded by family, friends, and Fraternity brothers during his final week at Hospice Atlanta.

Originally diagnosed with the disease on June 24, 2008, Jeff was expected to live only 6-8 months. Not satisfied with that prediction, however, Jeff and his family fought the disease valiantly for over two years. His remarkable story can be found at www. caringbridge.org/visit/jeffrosenberg/ mystory. In September 2008, shortly after his diagnosis, Jeff was joined by over 40 of his Fraternity brothers at Cornell Homecoming, at which time family and friends donned garnet colored "Zulustrong" wrist bands that were made for the occasion. They served as a constant reminder of his fight for nearly two years.

Born and raised in Jericho, Long Island, Jeff came to Cornell in the fall of 1982 to study industrial and labor relations. In addition to being a leading member of Beta Theta chapter. he was passionate about music and sports (especially Pat Metheny and his beloved New York Mets). He was a member of the Cornell Big Red Marching Band and performed as part of an acoustical duo with his close friend and fellow Cornellian. CJ Biederman. He was a member of virtually every intramural sports team fielded by Beta Theta, and played with an intensity that mirrored his approach to life (and ultimately his fight against cancer): Never Give Up!

Elected by his pledge class as pledge class president, Jeff was given his nickname, Zulu, by his brothers. He was that rare personality who comes along every 10 or 15 years or so, leaving an indelible mark on the chapter and those who knew him.

Following his graduation from Cornell, Jeff attended Albany Law School, where he served as executive editor of the Albany Law Review. He was an associate with Dewey Ballantine and later Hunton & Williams in New York and London, before moving down to Georgia to continue his law practice and later serve as general counsel of several companies, his last position as vice president and general counsel with SecureWorks, an information security company headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia that provided remarkable support to Jeff and his family during his battle.

He is survived by his beautiful wife and soul mate of 10 years, Coleen Price Rosenberg, daughter Gracie and twin sons Grant and Bradley, parents Eleanor and Edward Rosenberg, younger brothers Steven (Cornell, Beta Theta '85) and Doug, and nephews Kyle, Bennett and Griffin.

Jeff was the embodiment of friendship, love and truth. He is, and shall always be, sorely missed by those who had the privilege of knowing him. Hail, Zulu Warrior! Zulustrong! Phi Phi K A.

KIPP ANDREW STRUVE (Lamar, Epsilon Kappa '01)



Kipp left us before he could return to where his heart was: Texas. He passed into the Chapter Eternal on January 2, 2011 and has been laid to rest at

the Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery in San Antonio, Texas. He is survived by his parents, Bill and Diane Struve; his brother and sister-in-law, Dirk and Jennifer Struve; and his uncles, aunts, and cousins in California and Oklahoma. Kipp lived in San Antonio most of his life, graduating from Winston Churchill High School in 2000, where he earned his varsity letter in wrestling. After his first year of college, he and a friend toured Europe. At the conclusion of their travels, Kipp spent the rest of the summer working for the US Army in Wuerzburg, Germany, where he received the 2001 Commander's Award for the Most Outstanding Summer Employee.

He attended Schreiner University in Kerrville and Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas. His untimely death kept him from reaching his goals of completing his college work in California and returning to Texas.

November 18, 2001, was a key date in Kipp's all-too-short life: he was initiated into Epsilon Kappa Chapter. Kipp followed the family Pike tradition set by his father Bill (Oklahoma, Beta Omicron '71) and brother Dirk (Texas Tech, Epsilon Gamma '99). Kipp loved his Fraternity and brothers. He served his chapter in as many capacities as he could: secretary, internal vice president, delegate to the 2002 International Convention and to the 2003 Lone Star Regional Conference, and as a member of the rugby team. For his loyalty and hard work, he was recognized as the 2004 Epsilon Kappa Brother of the Year. Kipp also was a member of the Loval Order of the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity.

Kipp had a huge heart, a vibrant smile, a contagious sense of humor, and a deep love for people. He fiercely loved his family, his friends, his Fraternity, and Texas. It is fitting that his memorial service was held at his home church, University United Methodist Church of San Antonio. 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
