REFLECTING ON MY PIKE EXPERIENCE

he opportunity to serve as a vice president on the Supreme Council for the past year has been an incredible experience. I could not imagine a better way to end my career as an undergraduate member of Pi Kappa Alpha and transition into an alumnus/volunteering role within the Fraternity. I've gained a new perspective on the International Fraternity as a whole and what ties all our chapters together. Adding this perspective to the lessons I learned as chapter president and council president at Northwestern, I've compiled a valuable set of lessons and experiences to bring into my career.

I made it a goal to spend a significant amount of time during my senior year reflecting on my college experience and identifying what I learned about leadership and about myself (I even took a class devoted to it). I isolated a few factors that played a key role in effective leadership at all levels of our organization.

Knowing your Purpose

On the Supreme Council, we frequently have extensive discussions about the purpose of the Fraternity and its affiliated entities. It's easier to focus on goals and the mission of the organization in this setting, because the Council is designed to address the big picture and is not involved in day-to-day execution. However, these discussions are even more relevant when brought down to the chapter and council levels of organization.

Identifying how you would like your brothers to view their Pi Kappa Alpha experience is a good way to start defining what you want to accomplish as a leader. Developing these thoughts into a core set of non-negotiable values allows us to lead our brothers and ourselves in an honorable manner. If every one of our chapters did this, my guess is that they would all focus on the unique aspect that brings us together: we strive to develop men of integrity, intellect, and high moral character.

Even in decisions as simple as budgeting for a small event, what this says about your organization's purpose can provide a great deal of guidance. What do your decisions say about your organization's priorities?

Thinking Long-Term

A common teaching of leadership is to make decisions based on long-term ramifications, instead of on a day-to-day basis. Instead of asking, "How will this impact me tomorrow?" great leaders should always ask, "How will this impact us five years from tomorrow?" Once again, this perspective is very apparent on the Supreme Council level, but can be more difficult to see at the chapter level.

This principle is especially challenging as chapter leaders may only be undergraduates for a year or less after the end of their terms. In addition, it is very easy to get caught up in day-to-day execution, just trying to accomplish one task and move on to the next one. Lastly, the fact that long-term reasoning and impacts are generally less quantitative also makes justifying this reasoning more difficult. Recognizing these sources of a short-term mindset is important in changing your thinking.


In many ways, your success as a leader cannot be determined until well after you leave. This shows that the organization's success during your term was not attributable to decisions that sacrificed the future. It also shows that you invested in the future leaders of the organization and set them up for success. It's easy to think of chapter leadership as a one-term responsibility. However, developing the next generation is your responsibility and the performance of those leaders is one metric for defining your success.

The International Fraternity pours an enormous amount of resources into developing future leaders, not the least of which is PIKE University. It's difficult to plan for and overcome long-term challenges while the fraternity world is changing rapidly. But if this perspective of taking responsibility for the future is passed down from leader to leader, we will have sustainable success.

Prioritizing Relationships


Understanding the value of and learning to prioritize relationships has been another invaluable takeaway from my Pike experience. As I am about to graduate, it has become clear how important the relation-

Executive Vice President Justin A. Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon lota '96) has announced the retirement of **Gwen DeShazo Irwin** from her role as membership and database coordinator at

the Pi Kappa Alpha International Fraternity Headquarters.

During her 39 years of service to Pi Kappa Alpha, Gwen served two executive directors, two executive vice presidents, 21 international presidents and their respective boards, while working alongside 305 former and current PIKE staff members. Gwen came to Pi Kappa Alpha in 1974 and initially was associated with the accounting department. She has spent the majority of her career with Pike as the authority in membership records.

Gwen specialized in the area of membership records, processing 165,000 initiations, and ordering charters for 94 new chapters during her tenure. She served as a front line contact for the chapter consultants and provided customer support for countless chapter secretaries. She established a strong foundation of Fraternity operations knowledge, and became the expert on constitutional matters related to membership. Gwen's loyalty and dedication to the strategic goals and direction of Pi Kappa Alpha have certainly contributed to the successes that the Fraternity has achieved.

Gwen's dedication and loyalty have helped make the PIKE staff what it is today and have contributed to the Fraternity's achievements over nearly the past four decades.

BINGHAMTON UNIVERSITY CHARTERED AS MU GAMMA CHAPTER

Fifty-seven men initiated in Binghamton, New York.

n Friday evening, March 15, 2013, at Binghamton University, 57 men were initiated into the proud brotherhood of Pi Kappa Alpha. After years of work, the brand new Mu Gamma Chapter was proud to shake hands with International President Mat Forrest and call him "brother".

Brothers from the colony at Binghamton met at Christ Episcopal Church on Friday night to go through the initiation with the help of the brothers from Lambda Zeta Chapter (Drexel) and Kappa Delta Chapter (Northeastern). International President Mathew J. Forrest (Southern Illinois, Iota Mu '94), Director of Expansion Joe Wegelin (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '07), former Expansion Consultant Brent Kottner (West Virginia, Alpha Theta '06), and Director of Real Estate Reuben Rodriguez (Bowling Green State, Delta Beta '07) were present and led an initiation ceremony that lasted well into the night.

The following morning in the Binghamton University Lecture Hall, all the new brothers gathered once again for the installation of Mu Gamma Chapter into the Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity. Once the ceremony was

complete and Mu Gamma officially installed, the celebration began. Brothers traveled to the Riverwalk Hotel for a night of food, dance and merriment at the chapter's chartering banquet. Alumni Advisors Dan Barnett (North Carolina State, Alpha Epsilon '88), Ken Hull (Cornell, Beta Theta '61), and Bruce Reddock (Hofstra, Lambda Pi '07) were present and gave speeches, as did members the Headquarters Staff and Chapter President Gabriel Wolfson. The keynote speech address was given by International President Forrest.

Colony to Chapter

In Spring 2007, alumnus Dan Barnett moved to the Binghamton area and wondered why there was no Pi Kappa Alpha chapter at the university. With help from the Memorial Headquarters office, a representative was sent to the school to begin a new colony. In spring 2010, Kottner and Rodriguez recruited 45 men to take up the task. Alex Turo, former recruitment chairman for the colony at Binghamton, worked with Colony Consultant Ryan Nguyen (North Texas, Epsilon Delta '08) to set up an aggressive recruitment committee, and brought the colony up to 70 members

by the end of the Spring 2012 semester. With 57 men initiated at the chartering, Mu Gamma Chapter has made Pi Kappa Alpha the premier fraternity at Binghamton University.

Throughout the journey, the colony achieved many things, including over \$4,000 in philanthropy and undefeated intramural sport championships.

At the time of colonization, Binghamton campus was under scrutiny for hazing. Pi Kappa Alpha's dedication to the Fraternity's values and strong stance against hazing has helped turn the university community around. With its status as the largest fraternity on campus, Mu Gamma Chapter has shown that brotherhood is built with positive experiences.

University History

Binghamton University opened its doors as Triple Cities College in 1946 to serve the needs of local veterans returning from service in World War II. Originally located in Endicott, five miles west of the present campus, the fledgling school was a branch of Syracuse University.

ZETA MU CHAPTER RETURNS TO THE UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

A Pi Kappa Alpha chapter returns to the Pacific Northwest.

he colony at the University of Idaho was officially installed as Zeta Mu chapter on March 23, 2013 with 59 men initiated the previous day. Initiations were conducted on the campus of Washington State University with the help of Alpha Tau (Utah), Gamma Epsilon (Utah State) and Gamma Xi (Washington State) Chapters, as well as Director of Expansion Joe Wegelin (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '07). Zeta Mu chapter was installed by former International President Kevin E. Virta (Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83) and Director of Operations Lance A. Horner (McNeese State, Lambda Upsilon '10).

Originally chartered in 1966, Zeta Mu Chapter fell silent in 2008. After a five year absence, Pi Kappa Alpha is once again poised to succeed in Idaho.

The banquet for the newly rechartered Zeta Mu Chapter was held

in the Student Union building of the University of Idaho where members were joined by their dates, local alumni, Dean of Students Dr. Bruce Pitman and Assistant Greek Advisor Jordyn Wright. Dr. Pitman opened the night's addresses by discussing his connection with the original chapter at Idaho and the return of Pi Kappa Alpha to the University. Past International President Virta gave the keynote address praising the accomplishment of chartering and also challenging the members of Zeta Mu to continue to strive for excellence.

Recolonization

The recolonization of Zeta Mu Chapter began in spring 2011, when Expansion Consultants Matt Collette (Virginia Tech, Epsilon '06) and Daniel Ryan (Missouri S&T, Alpha Kappa '06) arrived on campus and started recruiting immediately. At the end of their six week stay, they had pinned 65 men who quickly began organizing and competing within the Greek community. During their three semesters as a colony, the men helped raise upwards of \$3,000 for philanthropies including the local fire department and food bank, as well as amassing over 1,500 service hours with projects that included working at a local horse rescue and rehabilitation center.


The University

The University of Idaho was established in 1889 as a rural land-grant university. It has an enrollment of 12,000+ students, with 16 fraternities and 10 sororities, giving Greek life 44% of the on-campus student population.

Located in Moscow, Idaho, the university offers 130 bachelor's, 88 master's and 32 doctoral programs.

MU DELTA CHAPTER CHARTERED AT McMASTER UNIVERSITY

Hamilton, Ontario is home to the newest Canadian chapter.

he weekend of April 5-6, 2013 is another proud notch in Pi Kappa Alpha's vast and illustrious history. Over those two days, 50 men eagerly joined the ranks of one of the biggest secret, Greek letter, social fraternities in the world. Mu Delta Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha at McMaster University had its members initiated on April fifth and Mu Delta Chapter was installed on April sixth, followed by a celebration banquet. The initiation took place at Grace Lutheran Church 1107 Main Street West in Hamilton Ontario. The men of the McMaster Colony and brothers from Kappa Mu (Wilfrid Laurier) and Iota Omega (Western Ontario) Chapters were up late into the night conducting intiations. Past International President Kevin E. Virta (Western Michigan, Epsilon Psi '83), with the help of Director of Expansion Joe Weglin (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '07), Alumni & Volunteer Officer Ben Boden (Iowa State, Alpha Phi '01) and Mu Delta Alumni Advisory Board Chairman Matt Chornaby (Western Ontario, Iota Omega '07), conducted the installation

of Mu Delta Chapter in the Burke Science Building on the McMaster University campus. The air in the room was buzzing with excitement and novelty. As on the night before, the men of Mu Delta Chapter were dressed in suits, but this time they were proudly wearing their new Pi Kappa Alpha badges over their hearts.

Mu Delta Chapter's chartering banquet took place at Liuna Station, 360 James Street North in Hamilton, Ontario. All initiated members were in attendance, as were their dates, alumni of the chapter and the members' parents. International President Virta, his son Trevor, Boden and Weglin were also in attendance, sitting at the head table. Alumni Advisory Board Chairman Chornaby and other Iota Omega alumni and actives were also present. Some sororities from the University of Western Ontario and a few Greeks from McMaster University graced the event with their presence. International President Virta delivered the keynote speech, which covered all aspects of being a Pike. He discussed

how important it is to embody scholarship, leadership, athleticism and the honor of a true gentleman, and the significance of continuing them throughout one's entire life. Giving back to one's community, chapter, alumni foundations, and Pi Kappa Alpha as a whole by representing these four pillars was also stressed. Finally, awards were given at the end of the night. Simon Filice was awarded the Nick Vityuk Presidential Award for administering presidential duties; Michael Stewart received the Huzaifa Saeed Pike Scholar Award for the highest GPA; Sam Soloman acquired both the Sebastian Recoskie Gentlemen Award for best exemplifying the gentleman quality in SLAG and the Taran Ohsen Philanthropy Award for doing the most philanthropy work. Sergeant at Arms Stuart Collins accepted the AJ Clancy Master Award for completing a year in his position: Ben Kinsella obtained the Bilal Husain Recruitment Award for recruiting the most and best men.

The best new members of each semester were Michael Szmudrowski and Nilen Thamphirasan – both received the Filice Colins Initiative Award, Chris McNeil-Smith secured the Chris McNeil-Smith Fundraiser Award for raising an extremely substantial amount of money towards Mu Deltas chartering banquet; Mukhtar Galan was awarded the Jeremy Bober-Inoue Most Improved Award; and Abdiwahab Bashi Ali accepted the George Letterio True Pike Award for best exemplifying SLAG. Finally, Rebecca Weatherall was named "Dream Girl of Mu Delta Chapter" to acknowledge what a huge help she was for the chapter's fundraising efforts.

Colonization

The road to chapterhood began when Nick Vityuk, the colony's president, contacted Director of Expansion Ryan Collett (Kansas State, Alpha Omega '04) and the two began talking about starting a colony at McMaster. On September 25, 2011, Expansion Consultant Danny Ryan (Northwestern, Gamma Rho '11) came to Hamilton and colonized the 20 men in the interest group. Over the two year colonization period, three expansion consultants have worked closely with the McMaster Colony: Ryan, Nate

Summerfield (Nebraska-Kearney, Iota Gamma '07), and John Mickles (Drexel, Lambda Zeta '09).

As a colony, the men at McMaster have been very active in the university and Hamilton community. In philanthropy, community service, and donations, they've organized a Ronald McDonald House Bottle Drive every year, donated money to the Salvation Army by selling club tickets, and donated money to the McMaster cheerleading team since the team doesn't receive funding. They have participated in the annual Terry Fox Run, Movember Campaign, Dodge for a Cause, Right to Play Annual Charity Ball Hockey Tournament, Relay for Life, McMaster Students Union Annual Charity Golf Tournament, McMaster Students Union Night Market, and have cooked and served

dinner at the Salvation Army. In athletic endeavors, they have put together a McMaster intramural flag football team, and won second place in McMaster intramural ice hockey.

As Mu Delta Chapter, they have many goals. Their main goal is to win a Smythe Award in the next two years and to be a 100 Man Chapter in the same amount of time. The chapter is also looking to be the number one team in ice hockey and flag football and to put a water polo team together.

Mu Delta Chapter is the first Pi Kappa Alpha chapter in Hamilton and is one of three chartered fraternities at McMaster University. Since the colony came to Mac, Greek Life has grown to six fraternities and four sororities. Pi Kappa Alpha Mu Delta Chapter is the largest and premier Greek organization on campus and will continue to be, establishing a culture of excellence for future brothers.

The University

McMaster University was founded in 1887 by Senator William McMaster, first president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. The university relocated from Toronto to Hamilton in 1930. McMaster has a large and diverse student body, with 21,025 full-time undergraduate students and 3,436 full-time graduate students.

Four years later, when the college was incorporated into the State University of New York, it was renamed Harpur College in honor of Robert Harpur, a Colonial teacher, patriot and pioneer, who devoted his later years to settling the area around Binghamton.

Until 1953, Harpur College was one of only two public liberal arts colleges in the state. In 1961, the campus was moved across the Susquehanna River. Growing enrollment and a reputation for excellence soon led to the selection of Harpur College as one of four

doctorate-granting University Centers in the state system.

In 1965, the campus was formally designated the State University of New York at Binghamton. Binghamton University was adopted as the informal name in 1992.

Known by many as the "Public Ivy," Binghamton University is one of the most prestigious universities in the northeastern United States. Due to its status as a State University of New York school, however, it comes with an affordable price that attracts an incredibly diverse array of students from around the world.

PAY IT FORWARD

What it means to be philanthropic

Whether it was our parents, a teacher, or a benefactor we have never met that paid for our college education, most of us owe our success to more than just hard work and blind luck.

A historical glance at philanthropy

Many of us, in fact, can say the origins of our current success lay in the hands of someone who gave us something. While the earliest accounts of true philanthropic work date back to the ancient Egyptians. more intrinsic examples begin with the mathematician and philosopher, Plato. Upon his death in 348 B.C., Plato left a farm to his nephew with specific instructions that the proceeds and land be used to support students at the academy he had founded. Fast forward 500 years and find that Roman emperor and Stoic philosopher, Marcus Aurelius, was the first to introduce the concept of endowed gifts, or gifts in perpetuity. Aurelius endowed chairs for each of the major schools of philosophy in Athens in 176

Later, in 1601, Queen Elizabeth signed the Statute of Charitable Uses. This was essentially the first law enacted allowing organizations and subsequent contributions to be tax-deductible, thus leading us to modern philanthropic practices.

John Harvard, an English minister on his deathbed in 1638, willed half of his estate and his multi-volume library to a new-found school in Cambridge. His bequest was so well received, the board elected to name the school Harvard College. With momentum from that initial gift, Harvard University became the first institution to conduct a giving campaign, and over the next ten years would establish the foundation for the methods of giving we see today in higher

education. Harvard's endowment was worth an estimated \$31 billion in 2012.

Of course, there are numerous philanthropic movements outside of higher education. Many would assume that faith-based giving dominates American's charitable efforts. While religious donations account for about one-third of all charitable gifts annually in the United States, there are a multitude of focus areas. Destinations for these gifts may vary greatly, but the fact remains that we do live in the most generous country in the world.

A 2011 study by the Charities Aid Foundation found that 65% of American families gave money to a charitable organization. Also in 2011, we were responsible for amassing \$298 billion to charities and foundations in the U.S. This accounts for roughly 2% of the United States GDP, a percentage that has remained fairly stable for more than three decades. As a point of reference, a review of the 2010 North American Interfraternity Foundation's 990 will show that fraternity and sorority foundations' combine for assets totaling a meager \$534,590,742 - equivalent to about 1.5% of Harvard's overall endowment.

Advancing the ideals of our Fraternity through giving

While historical knowledge is essential to understanding the prevalence and framework for today's philanthropic pursuits, what's more important is that we embrace a mindset of service and giving. No, Pi Kappa Alpha is not a service fraternity, but then again, do we really need to be labeled as such in order to act as one? In spouting statistics about our organization, we dig into the bag of impressive one-liners and

more often than not talk about our cumulative community service hours or philanthropy dollars.

It's a cornerstone of building a successful chapter, and it's a key tactic in recruiting the best men we can find, but is it a mind-set? All too often, when we think about raising money for our charity of choice, we think about maximizing a donation as a platform for throwing a party. That's not the mind-set we need.

"How can we raise the most money, raise awareness for the organization or cause, and raise the character of our chapter and its members?"

That's a mind-set that all of our chapter leaders and members should adopt. That's philanthropy. Creatively raising awareness and proceeds for an organization that is helping others attain and achieve those basic human needs in the foundation of Maslow's pyramid.

There are few greater callings than that of a philanthropist. You don't need to be Plato or Bill Gates to understand that the things we give can make a difference to the world.

This audience of Pike men – men who've enjoyed their collegiate years, landed their first jobs, worn out their shoe leather, started a family, been promoted, and earned a comfortable living – are called to give back. We find it written in our very own preamble:

...For the mutual benefit and advancement of the interests of those with whom we sympathize and deem worthy of our regard, we have resolved to form a Fraternity.

Let's never forget the promises we made to Pi Kappa Alpha, and the type of men we should constantly strive to be. Let's pay it forward.

BETA ETA CHAPTER (ILLINOIS) STUDENTS LEND LEADERSHIP SKILLS TO UNIVERSITY AND CHAPTER

ichael A. Cunningham '11, a junior liberal arts and sciences student at University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, was elected from among six candidates for the university's student trustee position. The University of Illinois board of trustees includes 15 members: 11 are elected by official votes, one is appointed by the governor, and three student trustees are elected by their respective student bodies (one from each of the three University of Illinois campuses).

Cunningham wants to develop more representation from all campus organizations by creating committees of registered student organizations to discuss real issues within the campus. He also wants to make more student fees refundable. By doing this, students that use certain resources will pay a fee in their tuition, while ones who do not use those resources will not have to pay, effectively lowering tuition for all students on campus.

To be elected to such a prestigious position, Cunningham has risen up the ranks not only with his motivated character and natural leadership, but also by sitting on various committees and gaining experience in different organizations around campus. In his sophomore year, he sat on the Illinois Student Senate's internal affairs committee and its subcommittee on campus safety. He also became involved on campus through Illinois Business Consulting. He started participating with the organization as a consultant and was promoted to project manager, a position that requires great leadership and analytical skills. Cunningham is also a member of the Phi Gamma Nu Professional Business Fraternity, which he has served as assistant new member educator and fundraising

chairman. In Beta Eta Chapter, he has proven his motivation through positions such as assistant new member educator, membership affairs chair, secretary, and most recently, chapter president.

As Mom's Day chair, he helped raise over \$5,500 for the house and successfully organized a great weekend for the mothers of the undergraduate members of Beta Eta. As the Pike Presents co-chair, Sailer helped organize the gathering of over 800 presents to be delivered to an impoverished elementary school. He was also able to help raise over \$2,000 to be donated to the same school.



The chapter has developed an academic buddy system where members help each other by organizing study groups and checking in with those who need to improve their grades. Alumni have enjoyed the chapter newsletters which include the popular Pike in the Spotlight and Pike Alumni Questionnaire sections. Community service opportunities have included Habitat for Humanity, an Easter egg hunt for

children in the Oxford community and Kappa Delta's PaintBrawl philanthropy as well as several other Greek organization philanthropic events.

Delta Gamma brothers are encouraged to take part in campus organizations and clubs and to hold leadership positions in these organizations. DELTA RHO (Linfield)


Undergraduate chapter size: 41; new members: 7.

EPSILON IOTA CHAPTER SAYS GOODBYE TO LONG TIME MEMORIAL LODGE

or 39 years The Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Lodge, 2815 South Sprigg Street, Cape Girardeau, Missouri, served the brothers of Epsilon Iota as their primary social club and chapter meeting place. For decades, hundreds of brothers began their membership from within these walls. Changing times and imposed restrictions have caused the building to lose its usefulness. In February 2013, the House Corporation decided to terminate the lease and sell the property.

In 1973 the chapter was looking for an off campus venue to hold social events. The University provided on campus dormitory style housing but the brothers did not feel it completely met chapter needs. Coincidently, the Rock Levee School district was selling a 5,000 square foot rural schoolhouse about five miles from campus and two miles out of town.

The Marquette School, one of 107 rural schools in Cape Girardeau County, had been unused since 1968. Originally built in 1924 for the sum of \$15,000.00, this school served grades one through eight. Local Cape Girardeau resident Keith Emfleet, a 1966 eighth grade graduate said there were two classrooms. Grades one through four met in one side of the upstairs main hall and grades five through eight met in the other. A folding door divided the two rooms. At the 1924 Marquette Schools dedication ceremony, it was considered the finest rural school in the county.

When the chapter purchased the building, they immediately started to renovate the schoolhouse to better suit their social needs. Brother Scott Kinchen '74 recalled spending much of his early membership rehabbing the building. Classroom chalk boards were removed. A serving counter was added, along with a speakeasy type viewing door to insure verification of members before being admitted to meetings. With the assistance of a local business, a walk-in cooler was added to store refreshments. The chapter added indoor bathrooms, where before, there were only outhouses. By the 1975 school year, "The Lodge" as it became known, was the envy of all fraternities on campus.

For the next 38 years, the lodge served as a venue for all sorts of Pike events, including Sunday chapter meetings, Dad's Days, Lil Sis parties, Homecoming Parade float building to name a few. It survived tornados, floods, burglaries and vandalism yet it could not survive the changing times and new roles of modern Greek fraternity life. Gradually, restrictions on the use of the building increased and it was used less and less. Pi Kappa Alpha's Executive Vice President Justin Buck (Southeast Missouri State, Epsilon *Iota* '96) said, "We all knew this day would come, when it had outlived its useful life - although most of us probably assumed that day would come much earlier. Fortunately, the chapter has learned to thrive without it and in doing so has posed a tremendous challenge to



its alumni – a call to provide the financial backing for a more modern, traditional facility, closer to campus."

For the brothers of Epsilon Iota, the closing of the Lodge marks an end of an era and the beginning of another. Alumni organizations have already begun to plan for the next real estate endeavor, something much more relevant to today's Greek environment. However, saying goodbye to the place that holds so many fond memories will be difficult. The brothers of Epsilon Iota consider themselves lucky to have shared the experience of the Pi Kappa Alpha Memorial Lodge.






in a university entrepreneurship competition. His group's awardwinning idea was HealthSpark, an innovative solution to combat rising health care costs for large, self-insured companies.

chapter had motivation to succeed, and so Lambda Psi executed a solid fall recruitment and began to rebuild their strength.

Then the walls came crashing down.

Following the tragic, alcohol-related death of a Sigma Pi Fraternity new member last fall, Chico State University President Paul Zingg assumed the authority to suspend all of Greek life. In addition to the tidal wave of negative media flooding the Greek community, neither IFC nor the Panhellenic Council chapters were given any indications from the University administration as to whether they would be recognized come spring. Recruitment at Chico State is deferred, meaning freshmen can't join until their second semester in school. Without a continuing infusion of quality new members, the chapter would be in serious danger.

Would Lambda Psi let this setback be their fatal blow? No. Great players make great plays, as the saying goes, and Chico State Pikes recruited as if they were playing for the championship.

"We're winners," said Chapter President Kenny Brandt, "we will continue to recruit seven days per week." And, when IFC received campus recognition again, PIKE was already ahead of the curve, stunning the campus by 39 new members in the spring.



There are no secrets. The win is in the details the chapter used:

- · Cold calls and interviews
- Business attire at rush events and interviews
- Sorority presentations to generate names
- Recruitment workshop with full chapter
- Recruitment captains with clearly established responsibilities

"To ensure year-round recruitment," said Recruitment Chair Jordan Carroll, "we passed a name generation sheet around the chapter room at every meeting. Then we contacted *every single name* and stayed in *constant communication* with the men we wanted."

Names were generated from:

- Chapter members
- Sororities
- Freshmen met on campus
- Clubs
- Alumni
- Legacies
- · Community events

Another key to success was an organized recruitment committee, Carroll noted. "The best way to fire up the chapter membership was to empower them. Different members had different roles based on their individual talents. This made recruitment easier and got more brothers involved, while giving them a sense of responsibility." The chapter assigned different captains for marketing, interviews, tabling, and sorority presentations."

"We learned the PIKE recruitment model from the chapter consultant visit and the recruitment handbook," Carroll said, "And it worked."

Lambda Psi Chapter showed that an aggressive approach and hard work over time pays a handsome reward – despite great challenges standing in the way. Congratulations on winning recruitment at Chico State!







"We as a board know the absolute best way to ensure long-term viability for our chapter is by making sure they have the means to attend these educational events," stated Garnet & Gold House Corporation President Chris Ward (Arizona State, Delta Tau '77). "Thanks to encouragement



Recruitment Advisor to Delta Lambda

What does an Advisor do?



For years, Pi Kappa Alpha's best chapters internationally have utilized an alumni advisory board. They know that a team of volunteers advising the chapter is critical to achieving success. Now, for the first time in the fraternity world, PIKE's research supports this theory and makes a resounding case for support. Over the past four years, the Fraternity has actively tracked members of alumni advisory boards and the positions they hold. By comparing this data next to the chapters they advise, Pi Kappa Alpha has found that chapters with alumni advisory boards are performing at measurably higher levels than chapters without. In the next four issues of the magazine, different AAB positions will be highlighted to show what they do and the impact they are making.



Chapters with a Recruitment Advisor, on average, RECRUIT 4 MORE MEN EVERY YEAR than chapters without.



The most effective advisors are part of an active team of volunteers who coach undergraduates in key areas. The best chapters consistently make use of an advisor for recruitment.

The recruitment advisor works with the recruitment team to develop a year-round recruitment program. He meets with the recruitment team on a monthly basis, motivating the team to work toward short and long-term goals. He also assists the chapter in hosting semesterly recruitment and transition retreats to ensure the program's continued improvement. The recruitment advisor is instrumental in ensuring PIKE chapters consistently recruit and retain the best men on campus.

ALUMNUS SUCCESS SPOTLIGHT: MATT EGERER, POLITICAL SCIENCE MAJOR AND 2007 GRADUATE



Matt Egerer (Wisconsin-Whitewater, Kappa Omega '03) graduated from UW-Whitewater in 2007 and now works in one of Wisconsin's most historic buildings in downtown Madison: the state capitol. As a legislative aid to Representative and Assembly Minority Leader Peter Barca, Egerer relies daily on experience that he gained through his degree in political science.

"The subject matter about the mechanics and theories about government and politics goes hand in hand with the practical application we apply here at the capitol," Egerer said.

Just as representatives from the Wisconsin State Assembly debate and discuss on the future laws, rules and regulations, Egerer utilizes similar skills from his past courses and fieldwork in political science. "I always liked the debating and discussion aspect of it," he said. "A large part of political science is the debating of ideas and debating the merits of concepts and positions."

During his time at UW-Whitewater, Egerer was involved in student government, Kappa Omega Chapter and intramural sports. He also gained experience from jobs and internships, including the Walworth District Attorney's Office, the City of Whitewater and multiple political campaigns. "Internships are a great opportunity because they show you what it's like to be in the positions that you're considering. I felt like I got my feet wet in a number of things that were within my field of what I wanted to do."

After his internship with the District Attorney's office, Egerer realized the courtroom wasn't his forte, and he realized he really enjoyed state campaigning and lawmaking. After Egerer helped State Legislator Kim Hixon's campaign during his final semester at UW-Whitewater, Hixon made a pitch for Egerer during an assembly meeting, and another representative soon hired him after graduation.

Egerer also debunked the myth that political science degree holders won't find a job after they graduate. "Yes, political science is a broad field so you can do a lot of different things with it. But you can't go work at the political science store. With political science you have a great deal of flexibility, but you have to map out what you want to do with it," he said.

Egerer said that part of the wonderful thing about Whitewater is that you have the opportunity to be a big fish in a small pond. "Being in organizations gives you leadership, experience and a background so that when you walk into an interview, rather than talking about what you've been studying, you can say I was in charge of this, and here is something I've done. It gives you real world things you can point to and really show yourself as a potential employee."

Along with networking, Egerer recommends to both potential and current students to take your courses and projects seriously while in school and gain as much experience as you can. "You think you're not going to write papers when you graduate, but really you probably are in a variety of different professions. Everything for the most part is dealing with people. You'll have to summarize verbally or on paper what your points of view are."

Egerer hopes to continue working with politics and recommends the Political Science major to any undecided undergraduate. "Don't declare right away if you're not sure. I think it's good for a new political science student to have a loose plan. Take a variety of classes to see what you're interested in. At Whitewater you can take part in many opportunities."



ERNIE BANKS

An unprecedented view of the All-Star shortstop and first baseman's career through the lens of the times in which he played.

ne of a select few baseball legends to hit more than 500 home runs, Ernie Banks' Hall of Fame career contained memorable milestones including consecutive selections as the League's Most Valuable Player in 1958 and 1959. Respected by his baseball peers, beloved by Chicago fans and teammates, Banks did everything there was to do in the game he loved. Everything, that is, except play in a World Series.

In *Ernie Banks: Mr. Cub* and the *Summer of '69*, veteran sportswriter **Phil Rogers** (*North Texas, Epsilon Delta '74*) creates an unprecedented view of Banks' baseball career through the lens of the times in which the All-Star shortstop and first baseman played. From boyhood days picking cotton to being a multi-sport athlete as a teenager and then as a standout baseball player in the Negro Leagues following his high school graduation to his stint in the


army, Banks honed his skills and joined the Chicago Cubs in 1953.

Banks crossed paths with a collection of interesting people including Buck O'Neil, manager of the Kansas City Monarchs, Cubs owner Phil Wrigley, and the unpredictable Leo Durocher, who felt that Banks was washed up when he took over team management in 1966. All roads led to the summer of 1969, when the Cubs set Chicago on edge with a blazing run at the pennant only to run out of gas in September, undone by the Mets miracle.

NEWS OF BYGONE DAYS

125 YEARS AGO - 1888

Celebrating 20 years, Pi Kappa Alpha chartered its tenth chapter, Kappa, (Transylvania) May 1888. The charter was withdrawn 1889. The history of the other nine chapters as of 1888 included Alpha which remained active; Beta (Davidson) chartered March 1869, charter withdrawn 1869; Gamma (William and Mary) chartered February 1871, charter withdrawn 1887; Delta (Birmingham Southern College) chartered June 1871, charter withdrawn 1873; Epsilon (Virginia Polytechnic Institute) chartered November 1873, fraternities banned by school 1880; Zeta (University of Tennessee) chartered March 1874, charter withdrawn 1875, rechartered 1886, charter withdrawn 1887; Eta (Tulane) chartered January 1879, charter withdrawn 1881; Theta (Southwestern Presbyterian University) chartered October 1879 remained active and Iota (Hampden-Sydney) chartered November 1885 remained active.

100 YEARS AGO - 1913

From the June 1913 Shield and Diamond Chapter Letters section, Alpha Kappa Chapter wrote:

At the time of the writing of this letter things are very quiet at the School of Mines. We are all beginning to think of our approaching final examinations. A great many of the fellows are commencing to think about their summer jobs, too. By the time this issue of The Shield and Diamond goes to press the members of Alpha Kappa chapter will probably be well scattered throughout the United States. At the present time we are unsettled owing to the different things that always proceed moving. Our new house is nearing completion and will be ready for us on the 1st of June as we planned.

75 YEARS AGO – 1938

Alpha Chapter (Virginia) held its annual Founders Day Banquet at the Monticello Hotel in Charlottesville, Virginia on April 21 with 75 people present. The attendance was smaller than anticipated, the Easter holiday taking many undergraduates and faculty members away from the campus. In an effort to know better the alumni in the city and to create more interest in ΠKA among them, a diligent effort was made to have each one attend the banquet. Two undergraduates called on each alumnus and invited him personally; in addition to sending each a formal invita-

50 YEARS AGO - 1963

Delta Epsilon Chapter (Tennessee-Chattanooga) won first place in the 1963 Mortar Board sponsored All-Sing. Jerry Cannon was Chorusmaster. RONALD A. D'ALESSANDRO JR. (Rensselaer, Gamma Tau '92)

Ronald A. D'Alessandro Jr. entered Chapter Eternal peace March 11, 2013. He was a loving and devoted father, husband, son, brother and friend whose greatest pleasure was spending time with those he loved. D'Alessandro attended Albany Law School and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He was a prominent entrepreneur and member of the business community. His legacy includes Keohane & D'Alessandro, PLLC and EOS Technology Transfer. As an active member of the community, he served as chairman of the Brunswick Republican Committee and on the board of directors at Albany Medical Center, where he also enjoyed volunteering at the Children's Hospital. D'Alessandro had a love for the ocean and was an avid scuba diver. The family welcomes donations in memory of Ronald D'Alessandro to the Ronald A. PETER G. DECKER JR. (Old Dominion, Zeta lota '71)

graduated from the
Norfolk Division of the

College of William and Mary (Old Dominion University). In 1960, he graduated from the Marshall Wythe School of Law at the College of William and Mary and entered private practice as an attorney in Norfolk. He founded the highly successful law firm of Decker, Cardon, Thomas, Weintraub and Neskis. In 1995, he entrusted his law firm to his partners and stepped back from the daily practice of law when he became a substitute General District Court judge, serving all of the cities of Southeast Virginia, Decker served on countless boards and charitable foundations. He was instrumental in the redevelopment of downtown Norfolk. Decker helped

found the Business Improvement District, was chairman of the Nauticus board and a member of the Downtown Norfolk Council board. Former chairman of the Norfolk Airport Authority, he was a member of the Norfolk State University Board of Visitors, as well as the TowneBank Norfolk Board, Heritage Bank and Trust Advisory Board, the Greater Norfolk Corporation and the Eastern Virginia Medical School Health Services Board. For more than 40 years, Decker was a member of the board of governors and directors of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. For 50 years he led local fundraising efforts for St. Jude, raising tens of millions of dollars to benefit research into childhood cancer. He often performed on stage with actor and singer Danny Thomas to raise money for St. Jude and he recorded many albums with the Pat Curtis Orchestra, sold to benefit the hospital. Each spring, Decker sponsored a field trip to Nauticus to reward Norfolk elementary students who excelled in school. Each summer he sang with the Tidewater Winds symphony orchestra at the Harrison Opera House to raise funds for aspiring student musicians. In the early 1980s, he formed the Sons & Daughters of Lebanon in honor of his father's heritage. He served on the board of trustees of the International College of Beirut, Lebanon. For 11+ years, he served on the Virginia State Board of Corrections and served seven years as chairman. He later chaired the State Board of Education. He was appointed to these boards by four different governors. Decker received numerous area honors, including the Presidential Award presented by the Norfolk Jaycees in 1988. In 1994, ODU presented him with its highest award, the University Medal, and he was also honored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus in Ocean View and for many years served as the emcee for their annual parade. He also served as the first emcee for both Virginia Beach's Neptune Festival and Norfolk's Harborfest. In 1984, along with several close friends from the Norfolk Police Department, Decker founded the Law and Disorderly Club, which benefits local children's charities. In 1995, he was

the first to receive the L.D. Britt Community Service Award and in 1997, he received the Martin Luther King Leadership Award from the NAACP. The Urban League of Hampton Roads honored him with the Vivian C. Mason Award and the Norfolk Sertoma Club presented him with the Service to Mankind Award, both In 1998. Decker was named Norfolk's First Citizen by the Cosmopolitan Club in 1999. Two years later, he received the Volunteer Hampton Roads Lenora Mathews Lifetime Achievement Award. He and his wife Bess created the "Mermaids on Parade" campaign which raised money for the local arts community. In 2005, the Hampton Roads Crime Lines presented him with a lifetime achievement award. In 2011, the Downtown Norfolk Corporation honored him with a lifetime achievement award. He was also inducted into the Hampton Roads Business Hall of Fame. CLARENCE V. "CLAY" FORD (Arkansas-Little Rock, Zeta Eta '79)



Clay Ford entered Chapter Eternal on March 18, 2013. He served his country proudly in the U.S. Army as an infantry officer in a number of assignments ranging

from Germany to the Pentagon, retiring as a full colonel. During his military career, Ford set an NRA national record during highpower rifle competition. He was an active member of Gulf Breeze Methodist Church, a member of the Gulf Breeze City council for 15 years and mayor Pro Tem, and past president of the Florida League of Cities. He was a private pilot, a life member of the NRA, and a member of the Gulf Breeze Rotary Club. Ford was an outstanding attorney and a member of both the Arkansas and Florida bars. In the 70s, he was elected to the Arkansas House of Representatives and served as president of the Pulaski County Special School District. Since February 2007, he had been a member of the Florida House of

Representatives. The Florida Legislature passed a bill, SB 328 to honor Representative Ford. Effective July 1, 2013, The Certified Public Accountant Education Minority Assistance Program will be named for Brother Ford and be known as the "Clay Ford Scholarship Program".

Phillip E. Goodman entered Chapter Eternal on February 16, 2013. He graduated from Tulsa Central High School and enlisted in the U.S. Navy, where he served

He was on Ridgewood's Planning Board 1971-74, holding the position of chairman of the Site Plan Committee. While a member of the Mayport Council of the Navy League, he held the position of president from 2000-01. Up to his death Goodman remained active with Pi Kappa Alpha, serving as a trustee of the Pi Kappa Alpha Foundation during 1991-2000. He was a member of the President's Council and the Sabre & Key Giving Society. Additionally, he was a founding father of the Northeast Florida Alumni Association. Goodman loved quail and duck hunting with his friends, and was an avid golfer. Contributions in memory of Brother Goodman may be

WILLIAM J. JOSEPH III (North Carolina-Pembroke, Eta Omega '74)

William J. Joseph III entered Chapter Eternal on March 24, 2013. Pi Kappa Alpha was a huge part and core of his life. As a founding father of Eta Omega Chapter, his Fraternity brothers were his second family. Joseph continued to support the Fraternity through his membership in the President's Council. Professionally, he was a sports medicine trainer at Tulane University. He also managed the Holiday Bowl after the death of his father.

PETER L. SCOTT SR. (Ohio State, Alpha Rho '45)



Peter Lowell Scott Sr. entered Chapter Eternal on December 14, 2012. In 1945. He joined the U.S. Navy and entered the V-5 Program and spent two years at Yale

University. Later in life he was elected a lifetime member of the Navy League of the U.S.A. He attended Ohio State University Engineering College and graduated with a B.S. in Electrical Engineering in 1949. After graduation he took his first position with Foster Transformer Co. in Cincinnati, Ohio. His design work impressed Geophysical Services, Inc. of Dallas, Texas, which later became Texas Instruments. Texas Instruments recruited him and he remained there for three years in the electronics sector. At the age of 25 he resigned to start his own business, Hermetic Seal Transformer Company. It quickly grew to \$8.8 million in sales and was acquired by Dresser Industries in 1957. Scott remained as president of Dresser Electronics until 1963. He and his wife, Claire, and two sons then spent 1½ years on his yacht cruising the waters of the Bahamas and Florida Keys. His entrepreneurial spirit rose again and he formed a new company, Scott Electronics in Orlando, Florida. It became a major supplier of power supplies for military and industrial customers. Scott Electronics was acquired by The National Cash Register Company and Scott soon became vice president of NCR. In 1975, he accepted the presidency of United Technologies

Corp. Norden Systems Division. He reshaped it into a major military electronics contractor. By 1979 he became executive vice president of United Technologies, and became a member of the board of directors. In 1983 he again left corporate life to form a new company called Technology Transitions, Inc. Its purpose was to jump start new high-tech young companies. In 1985 Scott accepted the chairmanship of Emhart Corporation, which was acquired by Black & Decker Co. Scott then became chairman of Black & Decker, from which he retired in 1990. Scott donated nearly six million dollars to the building fund for a new world class engineering lab at Ohio State University, which was built on the site of the lab he used as an engineering student. The new complex is called Peter L. & Clara M. Scott Engineering Lab. In 1987 Scott established The Peter L. & Clara M. Scott Award for Excellence in Engineering Education at Ohio State University. He received the Distinguished Alumnus Award and also an Honorary Doctorate from Ohio State. He served on the Board of Directors of Mack Trucks, Hartford Steam Boiler, Dexter Corp., Bank of New England, Planning Research Corp., Kaman Corp. and the National Science Foundation. In addition he was an advisory director to Owens Corning Fiberglass Co. and National Intergroup, and also corporator to the Institute of the Living. In 2003 he established the first four-year scholarship at Shadyside High School from which he graduated in 1945. He was an avid fly and saltwater fisherman. He enjoyed vachting, and also spent long hours designing and making furniture in his woodworking shop. In later life he enjoyed painting in oils.

MATTHEW J. UHL (Rowan, Mu Alpha '11)
